CONTRACTS FOR FIRST SECTION

The Grand Trunk Pacific Will Begin Operation at Superior Junction.

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—The Grand Trunk Pacific Co. is evidently going to justify the rumor that 800 or 1 000 miles of the N. T. Railway will be under contract before the end of the year. Contractors are now invited to tender for the 220 miles constituting the branch from Fort William to the main line. The junction has been named Superior Junction. It is also announced that the section from the Junction to Winnipeg has been finally located, and that the Commissioners will invite tenders for this part of the main line at an early date. This is expected, as the G. T. P. are most anxious that connection shall be made by their line between the Prairie and Fort William.

The tenders for the Superior branch will be opened on September 15th.

Vice-President and General Manager Morse said this morning that this, with 275 miles from Portage La Prairie to Touchwood Hills, N. W. T., will make a total of about 800 miles of N. T. R. road-bed that will be under way by September 30th next. He remarked that this shows the excellent progress being made on the new Transcontinental and indicates that it will be running trains from ocean to ocean well before the time limit of December 1st, 1911.
