THE LAW OF COMPENSATION.

The Island has now been a week without mails from the mainland and during more than half that time telegraphic communication was shut off—twelve hours out of every twenty-four. There are certain obvious hardships in these conditions, but such as are of a philosophic turn of mind may possibly be able to find a measure of compensation—if not quite enough of gain to match the loss. Perhaps the best we can do under the circumstances is to endeavor to find such compensations as we can. For instance, if a longed for letter, which would be very welcome if received, is now delayed at Pictou, Tormentine or elsewhere on its way to the Island, is it not equally true that the unwelcome letter—it may be one containing a bill, or a draft, or some bad news is also "hung up" on the other side?

And then there are the papers, tons of them, printed in Canadian or American cities and on their way to Island readers. May it not be that people read too much of this class of literature, much of it too sensational for mental health and perhaps calculated to create a sort of mental dyspepsia? Possibly a week's fast, or rather a week of the less highly seasoned local newspaper literature may be of real benefit to our people. Possibly too they may appreciate more highly our home production in the way of newspapers than if the foreign article had not been detained on its way. Possibly some may turn to the reading of informing and useful but much neglected books, solely because their usual supply of cheap and trashy serial literature has been for the time cut off. If so there are quite real compensations for the detention of the mails. It may be also that some would like to have the entire mail service between the Is-

land and the Mainland cut off for a month if only that we should then have reached the worst with the better prospect of having conditions mended.

It is often a source of satisfaction, of a rather doubtful character perhaps, to know that other fellows suffer as well as ourselves. A little philosophical reflection will show that such is true in the present case. If we have scant tidings from the outside world, the outside world knows little of what is doing here. Think of the millions that may be at this moment pining for the latest tidings of the great hog question, the notable heresy hunt, or the latest application for a writ of certiorari. Think of those of the very highest station in the Dominion ruthlessly cut off from all social or epistolary connection with the loyal Council who once cheered so lustily for "Lade and Lordy Minto." Think of the statesmen looking to the east for light upon the great national and constitutional questions that have been here so ably discussed within the past few days, unable to obtain an Examiner, a Patriot or a Guardian of more recent date than January 26. Think too of the millions in the outside world who to this hour are sublimely unconscious that Arthur James Benjamin Mellosh Achilles in all the panoply of war is making ready to drag the modern Hector at his chariot wheels seven time round the Serbonian bog.

Verily there are compensations if one would but look for them and if we suffer some inconvenience, loss, or delay, there are others who must share with us a measure of our disabilities.

The Patriot is not quite accurate in stating that if the Provinces were each restored the number of members which they had on entering the union New Brunswick would have sixteen and Nova Scotia twenty-one. New Brunswick entered the union with fifteen and Nova Scotia with nineteen members in the Commons.

While France was the first in the construction of submarine boats for naval warfare and has got quite a fleet of these craft, and while the United States Government is constructing a number of submarines of the Holland type, the British Admiralty seemed for a time to lag in the race. Now the Scientific American of New York tells of a recent test of a submarine boat built by Vickers, Son & Maxim which shows that the British naval authorities have not been asleep. That journal admits that the new craft and three others now building will be more formidable than any with which trials have been made by other foreign powers and more powerful and efficient than the American boats of the Holland type.
