Briefs From Britain

By The Canadian Press. About 100 discharged soldiers have answered an urgent appeal by London transport services for conductors, porters and booking clerks.

In Emergency Health Maternity Hospitals built during the war in Britain more than 77,466 children were born up to Dec. 31, 1942.

In England and Wales 1,853 information centres to give advice to bombed-out persons have been established.

The infant mortality rate in Britain in 1942 was 49 per 1,000 births.

In the four years of war lifeboats of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution have saved 5,283 lives. Lifeboatmen have won 184 medals for gallantry.

The General Council of the Trades Union Congress has issued a statement criticizing the education for what it described as a too leisurely approach to educational reform.

The Ministry of Food has appointed a "Flying Squad" of five experts who will investigate complaints about bread and advise bakers how to make the perfect national loaf.

Wal Langtry, variety comedian for 40 years who claimed he had topped the bill in 800 English music halls, is to be knighted. Northumberland. His real name was William McLeod.

Paying tribute to the Russian navy which during the war in the Baltic Sea, said in a speech "there seems to be no limit to the power of that immense machine."

HEN AND MINERALS

Former Ch'town Veteran Joins Legion Services

The following item is from a Saint John N. B. exchange: William A. McKee, veteran of the South African and the First Great War, prominent member of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., and the Red Chevron Club, who has been identified with musical circles in the Maritimes for years will leave shortly to assume supervision of Canadian Legion War Service entertainment at Halifax.

Mr. McKee has been organist at St. Luke's Church, North End, for 13 years and for six years filled similar position with choralmaster duties in Moncton. On Sunday next he will play the St. Luke's organ for the last time.

Major McKee is pianist of the Kiwanis Club and was for a number of years a member of the Imperial Theatre Orchestra. At the age of 19, he joined the 18th Battalion of the Canadian Field Artillery and fought through the South African campaign. In the last Great War, he was with the Second C.M.E. Battalion, recruited in Charlottetown, P. E. I.

The removal of Major McKee to other fields of endeavor will be a considerable loss to musical circles here, associates say, and to the Legion branches in the work of which he has been an ardent and active since the last war.

(Major McKee is a brother of Harry McKee, former N. B. McKee and J. McKee of Charlottetown. Councillor McKee's son R. L. McKee served under Major McKee in the last Great War. "Dick," as he was known here, enlisted at the age of 17, and served at the front until the war ended. Councillor McKee received word recently that Dick's son R. McKee has enlisted in the American army and is a Lieutenant at the age of twenty-one. Dick and his family went to Boston from here 17 years ago.)

LONDON—Flight Sgt. A. W. Larden of North Bay, Ont., has just been awarded the conspicuous gallantry medal with the announcement of the decoration the story of his exploit was revealed.

Report Nazi-Held Tunnel is Blocked

NEW YORK, Sept. 27—(AP)—The BBC said today that latest reports showed the 2-2-mile long Mt. Cenis tunnel through the Alps, main railroad link between France and Italy, was still blocked after being blown up by the Italians shortly after the announcement of the armistice with the Allies, and "will be in order for several months."

The broadcast, recorded by CBS, said the condition of the tunnel, Mt. Cenis tunnel "one of the two railroad lines leading from France to Italy has been in a bad condition. The other line has been bombed from the air and damaged by sabotage acts."

Noted R.C.A.F. Ace Trained at S'ide

OTTAWA, Sept. 27—(CP)—Squadron Leader George Ughart Hill of S'ide, a fighter pilot who has shot down 14 enemy aircraft, one of them at night, has become the second member of the R.C.A.F. to win a second bar to his Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Force Headquarters announced today.

The only other R.C.A.F. pilot to win two bars to the Flying Cross is Sqdn. Ldr. J. E. Walker of Edmonton.

Hill was awarded the D.F.C. in April this year. He was then credited with four enemy aircraft.

By May he had added another to his score and was awarded his first bar, being cited for leadership during a battle against a superior enemy force on the Tunisian coast in which his squadron knocked out seven aircraft, without the loss of one of his.

The citation for the Pictou pilot's latest decorations credits him with the destruction of 14 aircraft, four of them within a few days outside Ottawa. He took a flying instructor's course and went to Summerside, P. E. I., where he stayed until he went overseas in January last year.

The citations—Sqdn. Ldr. Hill "Sqdn. Ldr. Hill, as a fighter pilot, has displayed exceptional courage and determination. He has destroyed at least 14 enemy aircraft, including one by night, and damaged many others. During recent operations from Malta he led his squadron with skill and resolution, personally destroying four enemy aircraft within a few days. "On one occasion he remained aloft, despite repeated and persistent enemy attacks, until he had shot down 10% of the enemy force for a comrade who had been forced to leave his aircraft by parachute."
