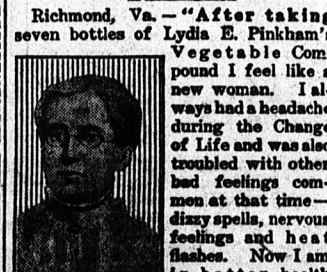

THOUSAND WOMEN WERE VICTIMS OF CLEVER SWINDLE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—An endless chain scheme, with a \$4.50 petticoat at the center of it, is making the United States postal authorities no end of trouble. A first wave of undelivered letters came to the Dead Letter Office today—fourteen sacks of mail, with 5,000 letters in each, and over \$7,000 in dimes, to be handled by the Dead Letter Office clerks and, if possible, returned to the senders. These letters were forwarded here from the Minneapolis post office, where they were received from their many thousands of expectant senders.

Postal detectives have been at work on the case to effect the arrest of the projector of the scheme, but thus far have not met with much success. It is estimated that up to this time over half a million letters have been received at the Minneapolis post office in consequence of letters sent out by the authors of the endless chain scheme and offering a petticoat to any woman who would write five letters copying a form enclosed, and send them to women of their acquaintance. The form required that each recipient of the letter was to write five more letters and on sending a dime to Room 520 Globe Building, Minneapolis, would receive a fine silk petticoat as a reward.

The post office detectives found that there was no such address as 520 Globe Building in Minneapolis. They learned that for a time two men got the mail for the concern at the post office and then stopped coming. They only got a small part of the money.
