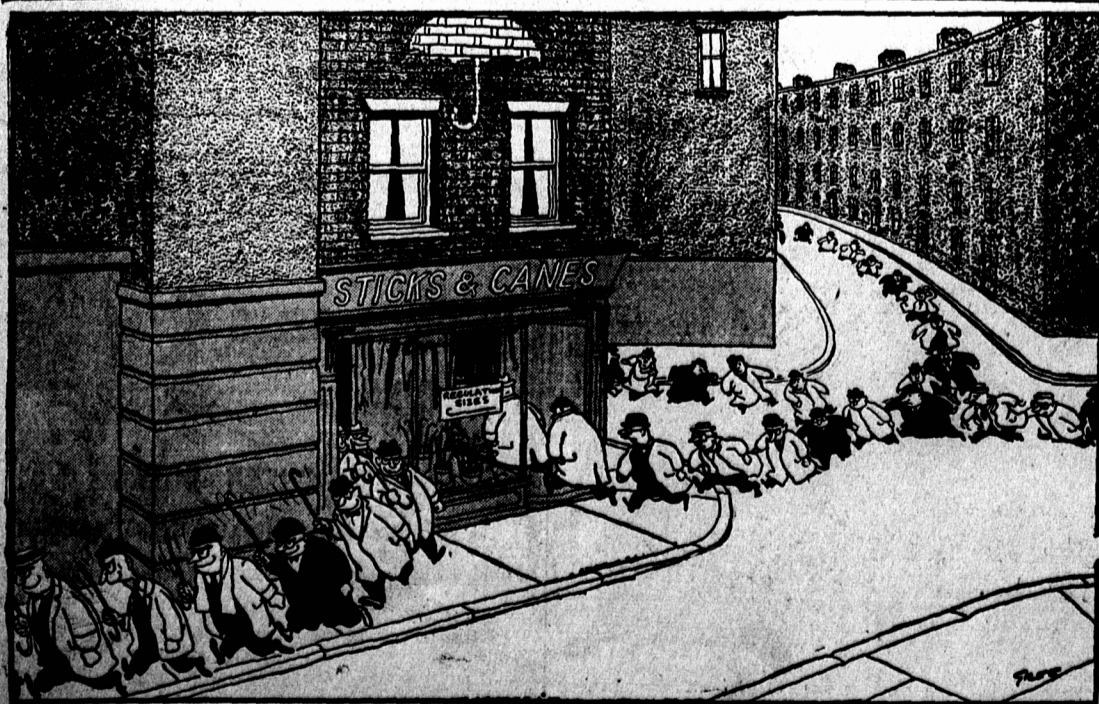

—SHORT COURSE ENDED—A three day short course was held at Bloomfield on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week under the auspices of the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University in co-operation with the Department of Agriculture and the National Film Board. Each afternoon there were three periods and two periods every evening with a showing of appropriate films by the National Film Board who cooperated in all these courses. The first subject taken up on Wednesday afternoon was a talk on soil problems by Mr. A. R. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm. This was followed by a talk on "Farm Fertility and Pastures" by George Whiteside, soil analyst, and a discussion on Fishermen's problems by Peter MacLellan, Fisheries Inspector. In the evening Mr. J. J. Larabee, Director of Fisheries spoke on "Our Fisheries" and this was followed by a discussion on CUNA insurance. The matters taken up on Thursday were: "Organizing a Community for Co-operative Work," a talk on swine by H. W. Clay, a talk on potatoes by Henry MacLaren, poultry by F. M. Nash and farm production by W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. On Friday Rev. M. J. Francis spoke on Credit Union promotion and discussions were held on "What a Credit Union means to a community" and "Co-operatives, the Middle Way." In the evening a talk on "the care of milk and cream" was given by J. Henry MacDonald and on boys and girls clubs by Stewart Wright. On Friday afternoon about 180 school children attended the discussions. The attendance at all meetings was excellent, particularly in the evenings when about 150 persons were present each evening.—S

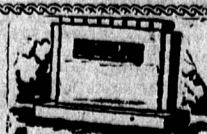
