—Nazi piloting Japanese planes

LONDON, Dec. 11—(CP)—A large percentage of the Japanese planes attacking the Malayan peninsula are piloted by Germans, the News Chronicle's Singapore correspondent reported tonight.

"Enemy plane losses from which the pilots were captured or killed establish that a large percentage of the pilots are Germans," the correspondent said.

The main British land forces have not yet engaged the Japanese who have gained a foothold north of Singapore, he added.

Even with the survivors here, the full story of what happened on the east coast of Malaya yesterday morning when the Prince of Wales and Repulse were down under a hail of Japanese bombs and aerial torpedoes was not available.

Some members of the crews said the first Japanese bomb smashed the airplane catapult deck of the Repulse. After that, under incessant attack, gunners died in bomb blasts and others manned their stations, keeping up the firing until hope for both ships was gone.

Seven Planes Shot Down

Seven attacking planes were shot down.

British planes, meanwhile, kept watch of the Japanese transport movements, while big bombers blasted at the foothold Japanese landing forces gained in the sweltering jungle to the north.

A communiqué declared British defences there were holding and that there are no reports of further attempts to land in the Kuantan area, nor were any enemy ships seen in that direction by air reconnaissance.

The war bulletin acknowledged Japanese bombers had hit heavily at British airfields in northern Malaya and said some of these were made temporarily unusable.

Penang off the west coast, was bombed heavily.

Baseball to Help U. S. Armed Forces

CHICAGO, Dec. 11—(AP)—Baseball made a preliminary gesture of help to the armed forces of the United States today and then disbanded the winter meetings with a handful of trades still hanging in the air.

In the joint session of the two major leagues a fund of \$25,000 was set up to buy bats, balls and other equipment for army and navy teams and a decision made to raise, perhaps double, the price of tickets for next year's all-star game, from which all receipts will go to the "bat and ball" fund.

An attempt to increase the number of night games from seven to 14 in each park was voted down by Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis after the two leagues split on the issue.

An amendment proposed by the minor leagues to allow farm systems to advance players through the minors without incurring optional service restrictions was voted down and the present major-minor agreement extended for one year intact.

When the meeting was over most of the magnates scattered to their homes but at least one trade talk was scheduled after the other club owners had left town.

General Manager Branch Rickey of the Cardinals had an appointment with President Phil Wrigley of Chicago Cubs and it was believed a deal that would send big first baseman Johnny Mize to the Cubs still was possible.

Russia reports Peace feelers From Germany

KUIBYSHEV, Russia, Dec. 11—(AP)—A Russian peace with Germany would be made only by joint agreement with Great Britain and the United States, Soviet officials declared tonight in announcing that Germany had put out peace feelers to the Soviet Union.

The Communist newspaper Pravda said of the situation: "The Hitler gang is ready any day to sign a peace with Russia if only our government would talk with them."

David Zaslavsky, Pravda's chief editorial writer, said, however, that a prerequisite of peace is liquidation of the "Hitler criminals."

erty loving people against the common menace."

Shortly before the announcement of a major naval success off Wake Island and without a single vote of opposition, Congress quickly took the step that made the United States a full participant in the war.

President Roosevelt, who had asked for the declaration immediately upon learning that Germany had declared war on the United States, signed the war resolutions as soon as they were received at the White House.

"The Navy Department announced that the action on tiny Wake Island, about half way between Hawaii and the Philippines, had repulsed four separate enemy attacks, and in the process had sunk a light cruiser and a destroyer from the air."

"Despite the loss of part of the defending planes and the damage to material and personnel, the announcement said, 'the defending garrison succeeded in sinking one light cruiser and destroyer of the enemy forces by air action.'"

"A resumption of the attack and a probable landing attempt is expected. The main garrison is continuing to resist. The above report is based on information received up until noon, Dec. 11."

The Navy's report quickly spread excited jubilation throughout a capital which earlier had learned that United States Army airmen operating in the Philippines had sent a Japanese battleship, the 29,000-ton Haruna, to the bottom.

War Secretary Henry Stimson, who made this announcement, also said Japanese attempts to land in the Philippines were determined opposition, and had been confined to the extreme northern tip of the Island of Luzon.

Although Manila dispatches told of the Japanese seizure, the airport in eastern Luzon, they also quoted army officials as saying the situation was "completely in hand," that "enemy detachments that landed on the Luzon coast are being disposed of" and that "mopping up operations are proceeding."

Prison term for N. B. Electric Power Commission Official

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 11—(CP)—After pleading guilty to the charge of stealing \$55,802 from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission over a period of years, Percy D. Machum, treasurer of the commission, was sentenced by Magistrate S. W. Palmer today to three years at hard labor in the Maritime penitentiary at Dorchester.

No evidence was taken at the hearing, held in the police court. According to information laid by Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the theft occurred between Jan. 1, 1932, and Jan. 1, 1941.

Two Island Men On R.C.A.F. list Of casualties

OTTAWA, Dec. 11—One man was reported killed on active service overseas, one dead from injuries received on active service overseas and one previously reported missing was reported killed on active service overseas in the Royal Canadian Air Force's 134th official casualty list issued late today.

Six men were reported missing after air operations overseas and three were reported killed on active service in Canada.

The list brings to 1,110 the number of air force dead and missing reported officially since the start of the war.

Sgt. Toussaint Joseph Arsenault, son of Mr. and Mrs. Philibert Arsenault, Abram's Village, is reported missing on active service in the official casualty list issued from Ottawa yesterday. His parents have been notified. He is about 25 years of age.

(The airman's mother was listed in the Ottawa story as Mrs. T. J. Arsenault but that might be her Christian name.)

It is believed Sgt. Arsenault was on active service in Egypt up until the present. His parents have received letters from him which were written in Cairo and Alexandria within the past few months.

He has been overseas since last April and had joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1940. He was a wireless-air gunner.

Sgt. Arsenault was a student at Prince of Wales College for two years and made many friends in the city. He finished his education there about six years ago and for a time taught school at St. Gilbert in the western part of the province.

Another brother, Leande, is serving in Canada with the Royal Canadian Air Force. He has two other brothers and seven sisters.

VICTORIA, Dec. 11—(CP)—Recruiting officers in British Columbia are being besieged by applicants wishing to join the army. Lieut-Col. H. E. Godman, district recruiting officer, said today: "The flood of applicants is the greatest in many months and machinery of attestations, medical boarding and documentation has swung into high gear to take care of the increasing numbers. Owing to the rush no records are available."

LONDON, CNT, Dec. 11—(CP)—T. H. Scott, Field Representative of the Dominion-Provincial War Emergency Training Program, predicted in an interview today that by the spring of 1942, 50 per cent of the personnel in Canadian War Industries will be women. Present percentage is estimated at 12. He said plans are going into operation whereby women will enter practically every field of industry and special plans will take care of their training.
