An adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last evening. Mayor McNeill and Councillor Reed absent.

A petition was read from a number of East End citizens asking for a light at Mrs. Baxter's corner. The matter was discussed at length and by different members of the Council and the board was addressed on the question by W. H. Manson and David Kirke.

This light was a bone of contention with a former Council and seems yet to be unsettled. A committee was appointed to look into the matter.

Councillor Clark's resolution re a by-law to repeal a by-law to impose a license on non residents, meat and vegetable dealers passed its second reading.

George W. Robinson addressed the council on the matter of exemption from taxation promised him by a former council. After much discussion Councillor Clark moved seconded by Councillor Morrison that an agreement be made with Mr. Robinson on the basis of his letter to the council and the resolution passed by the council in 1902.

Resignations were read from Mayor McNeill, Councillor John M. Clark and Councillor Leonard Morris as members of the board and all were accepted.

Mayor McNeill and Councillor Clark resign to contest the election each opposing the other for seats in the Local Legislature. Councillor Morris tendered his resignation with a view to accept the nomination for the office of Mayor in consideration of a largely signed requisition of rate payers.

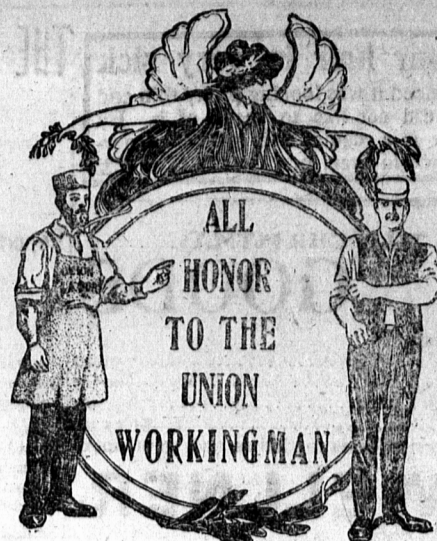
