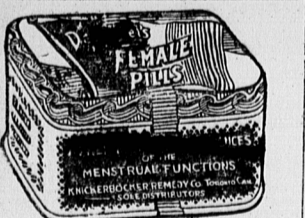

LONDON, Oct. 26.—An agreement to end the British coal strike appeared at hand today. All the Miners Federation executives attended a conference with Premier Lloyd George at 11.30 a. m., making it appear that formal negotiations had reopened conversations. The future selling price of coal will depend on production. That is, if production falls below a certain level, the price of coal will be increased to the householder; otherwise the present prices will be maintained. Under this plan the miners will receive more wages while operating with the owners in preventing increased prices.

SKIPPER TEN DAYS ON BRIDGE DURING STORM

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Captain John Goulindaris, master of the Greek liner Themistocles, in yesterday from Piræus, will get a loving cup for the gallant way he brought the ship through a ten-day storm that lasted until Sunday. He remained on the bridge until the fierce blow moderated, and by his assurances calmed timid passengers who thought the Themistocles was bound for Davy Jones' locker.

Dr. Dimitrios Constantindes, who was bacteriologist for Charlotte (N.C.), came on the ship. He went to Greece for his family a year ago and found his estate at Avalla in ruins. Only about a quarter of the normal population of the place, about 40,000, was left. The town had been sacked by Bulgarians and Turks and most of the inhabitants either killed or captured. The doctor's wife and her mother were among the dead.

A RAY OF HUMAN SUNSHINE

During the Great War the nations of the world were divided into two formidable groups. Their thoughts and feelings of mankind, their sought clearly defined channels through which to win victory for their respective sides, each of which strove for domination. In nations where militarism and ambition are ended great masses of men and women, released from the tension of war, have given way to their feelings of unrest and general disturbance. The result is that the hand is against the fellow man, class against class, capital against labour, handicraftsmen against thinker, all seemingly engaged in a selfish struggle.

But in the midst of the turmoil one brilliant ray of human kindness beams. The League of Red Cross Societies, some thirty nations strong, has undertaken the beneficent task of trying to prevent typhus from breaking loose on the world and to relieve the want and suffering of the millions of orphan children of Europe.

These, though innocent of the causes of the war, have been its greatest sufferers from its results. Ten million of them are fatherless, and of that number a large proportion have lost both parents. When it is remembered that during the years of war a great number of these children have been insufficiently nourished, it can be partly realized how great a task confronts the League of Red Cross Societies in its endeavor to repair the damage done by the sad years of war. At present the great tasks of helping the children and of stamping out devastating disease, which is now ravaging the poorer populations of Europe, have been begun. The British Empire will undertake a large share in this humane work, and under the patronage of His Majesty the King a relief fund has been started for
