## Bernard Garage And Three Cars Are Total Loss

Fire at Tignish last night destroyed Bernard's Garage and threatened other buildings until it was brought under control after a stiff fight.

Included in the loss were two buildings, the main garage and an adjoining building used to store equipment, all the garage tools and three automobiles. Mr. Henry A. Bernard is proprietor of the garage. The names of the owners of the cars were not learned immediately nor was it certain whether the vehicles were old or new models.

The first was discovered about 9:30 by the Tignish telephone operator. It had made considerable headway and the Tignish fire fighters were hampered when they found their fire fighting equipment would not work. The former A.R.P. pumper and hose were stored in the second garage building. The equipment was removed before fire reached it but all other contents of the building were destroyed.

With several buildings in imminent danger a call was sent to the Alberton Fire Department for assistance and a number of men with their truck and other equipment responded by the time they reached Tignish both garage buildings were enveloped in flames and several residences and the telephone office were in danger. The home of Archie Bernard caught fire several times and was saved only with great difficulty. Houses owned by Freddie Richard and Joseph Richard, slightly further away, also caught fire.

It was not learned whether there was any insurance. Origin of the blaze, which broke out in the main garage building, was unknown. The garage was well equipped, it was learned, and the loss is expected to be high.—S.

## Cancer Drive Begins In Summerside

The organization meeting of the captains and workers in the "give to conquer cancer campaign" was held last evening at Leo Coyle's Restaurant. After partaking of a very delicious poster supper, the workers were addressed by Mr. Francis McNeill, M.L.A., who has graciously consented to act as campaign chairman. Mr. McNeill pointed out the object of the forthcoming drive and called upon Mr. J. P. McInnis, the executive secretary, P.E.I., who outlined the work that has been done by the Cancer Society of Canada in its fight against the terrible scourge.

He pointed out that the need is not only to find a cure for cancer but to find cancer while it is yet curable. The main work of the society is education, to put aside the terrible fear and superstition prevalent in the minds of many people when they think of cancer. "Let us join hands now," the speaker urged, "and we may save some one we love from a death from cancer."

Mr. Morley Bell, co-chairman, assured the gathering that he was behind this drive 100 per cent and would do all in his power to put the drive over with a bang.

Acting Mayor Henry Wedge, John E. Campbell, president of the Red Cross in Summerside, Mr. Hugh Morrison, Councillor, Leo J. Gorrill and Herbert B. Schurman all gave assurances of their fullest support in putting the drive over the top.

The campaign will close on Friday evening and during the week canvassers will call on the people of Summerside to solicit their donations and it is fully anticipated that this worthy drive will receive their fullest support and that when the canvassers call they will be given the full cooperation of every citizen in Summerside.—S.

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## Prince Co. Member Is Guest Speaker At Ontario Club

(BROOKVILLE, Ont., May 27—Special)—Highlights of Prince Edward Island's history from its discovery by Jacques Cartier to World War II were presented to Brockville Kiwanis Club here today in an address by J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince.

"I now know the two most beautiful spots on the St. Lawrence system," Mr. MacNaught told the large audience. "One is the island in the Gulf from which I come and a section of which I represent at Ottawa. The other is your town here which is the gateway to the Thousand Islands."

The member for Prince emphasized the important role played by Prince Edward Island in bringing about Confederation and spoke of the pre-Confederation meetings at Charlottetown.

"It is a moot question," he said, "whether the island has profited or suffered as a result of Confederation. Many stoutly maintain that we would have been better off if we had never agreed to federate. It is abundantly clear however, that the benefits the people expected as a result of Confederation, never materialized."

The member for Prince extolled the beauties and advantages of Prince Edward Island as a holiday playground, assuring the Brockville Kiwanis that if they visited the Island, not only would they be delighted with their stay but they would return at the earliest opportunity.

He spoke of the efforts to colonize Prince Edward Island in 1731 by the French genius Jean de Roma, and amazed and amused the gathering by a description of the plagues of field mice between the years 1724 and 1738. Mr. MacNaught spoke also of the deportation of Acadians from the Island when it passed from French to British hands and how that policy is viewed today in the light of history.

The member for Prince was the third speaker in a series of meetings of the Brockville club which is inviting members from different parts of Canada to tell something of the history, industry and problems of their communities. A cardinal vote of thanks was voted by the club president.

## Conviction In Spy Case Is Quashed

TORONTO, May 27—(CP)—The Ontario Court of Appeal this afternoon quashed the conviction of Henry Harris, under sentence of five years on two charges of conspiracy, and allowed his appeal. Harris had been convicted at one of the Ottawa spy trials.

A. W. Beament, K.C., his counsel, told the Appeal Court the only evidence against Harris "is that he was a member of the Labor-Progressive Party and that he stayed in a certain hotel."
