



New York Fur Sale
NEW YORK, April 15.—Skins from the antipodes dominated the morning session of the fur sale in the Masonic Hall here today. The chief offering was nearly 175 tons of rabbit skins from Australia and New Zealand, including both hat and furrier grades; the former did relatively better than the latter. Buyers seemed most interested in Australian, Tasmanian and ringtail opossums, all of which moved freely. Ringtail cat also showed well, nearly 300,000 American opossum skins were offered. The averaged prices obtained for northern and central skins showed no change from the January sales levels of the New York fur auction sales corporation while southern and southwestern pelts averaged 15 per cent below Jan. Tasmanian opossum compared with Jan. was unchanged but Australian and ringtail opossum advanced 25 and 20 per cent respectively. Sales for the day were estimated at \$475,000 bringing the grand total to date to about \$2,130,000.
