COLOR EQUALITY IN FRANCE PARIS, July 25. (British United Press)—An American travelling in France, has been most unpleasantly reminded that the Republic has no "Jim Crow" laws and that a black subject has exactly the same

status as a white citizen. He was seated at a table in a restaurant when an attendant placed a negro opposite him. He immediately got up and went to another table. The waiter informed him that such a gesture constituted a breach of the laws of the count-

ty through which the train was passing. The affronted negro has brought an action against him for public insult.

STEEPLEJACKS' FEAT

LONDON, July 25. (British United Press)—Balanced on the shoulders of a fellow worker who stood on the top rung of a ladder 168 feet from the ground, a steeplejack succeeded in removing a large weathercock from the spire of St. Mary's Church, Ambleside.

As the bird was not particularly imposing and had never functioned in all the 77 years of its existence on its lofty perch, it was decided to replace it by another. Two steeplejacks volunteered to undertake the job. The hazardous task was accomplished by running up ladders nearly to the peak of the 180 foot tower. One of the men stood on the topmost rung while the other climbed onto his shoulders, and the trick was done. The least false move would have sent both hurtling down on the rocks below.

—LIVESTOCK MARKET (Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., July 28.—There were 3,357 cattle, 328 calves, 1270 hogs and 679 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today, including about 230 cattle, 700 hogs and 438 lambs, held over from yesterday's markets. 477 cattle were received at the yards from export to Great Britain leaving Montreal July 30th on the Manchester Division. Calves were easier, the bulk of the veal calves brought between \$5 and \$5.25. Lambs were slow. Between 300 and 400 lambs brought \$6.50, with an odd small lot at \$7. Culls were from \$4.50 to \$5. Hogs were unsettled. An odd small sale was made at \$8, with about 50 hogs at \$8.25, fed and watered. Sows brought from \$4.50 to \$5.
