## Halifax Navy And Hamilton Game Unlikely

HALIFAX, Nov. 28—(CP)—Prospects of a post-season football game between Hamilton and Halifax Navy are slim today as Wildcats reported they might not be in physical shape for another match after a tough season.

LONDON, Nov. 28—(CP Cable)—Blackpool, coming from behind in the closing minutes to lead Burnley 5-3 stepped into undisputed leadership of the soccer league north yesterday with 22 points, two more than their nearest rivals.

Until mid way through the second half, it looked as if Blackpool were due to take a beating. Trailing by three goals, they staged one of the recoveries for which they are noted and tallied five fast goals.

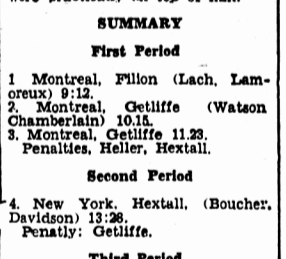

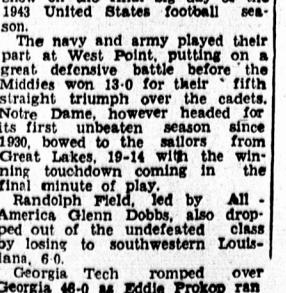

NEW YORK, Nov. 28—(AP)—Notre Dame lost its first game of the season Saturday after winning nine straight but in defeat grabbed the spotlight of what was scheduled to be an army-navy show on the final big day of the 1943 United States football season.

The navy and army played their part at West Point, putting on a great defensive battle before the Middle West 13-0 for their fifth straight triumph over the cadets. Notre Dame, however headed for its first unbeaten season since 1920, bowed to the sailors from Great Lakes, 19-14 with the winning touchdown coming in the final minute of play.

Randolph Field, led by All-America Glenn Dobbs, also dropped out of the undefeated class by losing to southwestern Louisiana, 6-0.
