LUNenburg, January 9—The term schooner Virginia is a total loss at Rose Head, a rocky promontory between here and the mouth of the LaHave river. GERMAN ELECTIONS TAKE PLACE TODAY

BERLIN, January 10—The preparations for the general elections place the Reichstag, which takes place throughout the empire Friday, show a curious contrast to the procedure of an Canadian election campaign.
