Egypt's Police Strike Ends

CAIRO, April 6.—Egypt's police strike ended today after riots that claimed 24 lives and caused heavy property damage in Alexandria, the country's second largest city. The capitulation of the strikers to a government ultimatum was regarded as a personal triumph for Prime Minister Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashy Pasha. It dashed hopes of the opposition Wafdist Party that the unrest would overthrow Nokrashy Pasha's government.

to remedy it at once if competent graders were in the vicinity to acquaint him with the results of their examination of his product. Mr. Burhoe concluded by saying it was his opinion that if competent inspectors on the fish at the plant were made, as well as competent supervision of the fish processing, grading would become unnecessary.

Quebec Conference

Queried by Mr. J. B. Myrick, Tignish, whether or not he had conferred with any Government officials at the recent East Coast Fisheries Conference in Quebec, Mr. Burhoe said the Deputy Minister of Fisheries had stated at the Quebec Conference that compulsory inspection of fish would be instituted in the Province if the industry wanted it.

Mr. W. H. Tidmarsh said he favoured the idea of compulsory inspection and supervision but doubted if the present local staff of the Dominion Department of Fisheries were qualified to do such work. He spoke highly of canned mackerel as a food, stating that the canned product was superior to any other canned fish and suggested that an advertising campaign sponsored by the Government to make canned mackerel better known would result in greater sales.

Mr. L. C. Johnson of the Dominion Department of Fisheries, said the local Department did not have the men competent to do fish inspection or to supervise the processing. He thought, if the proposed resolution was received favourably at Ottawa, that the Department of Fisheries would furnish men with the required ability.

Mr. C. P. McCarthy, Tignish, president of the Tignish Fishermen's Union, recommended the P. E. Island Fisheries Federation begin a drive to increase its membership. If the voice of the Federation was to be strong, Mr. McCarthy said, then every canner in the Province should become a member.
