The Latest Readable Happenings Occurring in the News District.

The highest temperature yesterday was 74.5.

MR. AND MRS. J. A. McLAREN, and family have returned from New Glasgow, where they enjoyed a pleasant outing.

ALBERT ALLIN, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$90 or 90 days with hard labor yesterday. Rosey Camfer, drunk and incapable, was fined \$5 or 30 days. Edgar McCarron, drunk and incapable, was fined \$10 or 60 days.

The following resume of the work done by Prosecutor Bears in two weeks will be interesting to GUARDIAN readers: On the 29th of July he obtained a conviction before Stipendiary Blanchard at Georgetown against John J. Stewart of Murray River. A case against Eliza Campbell was dismissed. On Aug. 5th a conviction was obtained against Daniel Skinner of Georgetown, and on Aug. 12th Joseph Robertson and Hester Robertson, his wife, of Cardigan and Harry Thompson of Albion, were each fined fifty dollars or two months. A case against Marjory Hillehey of Georgetown was dismissed for want of evidence. Joseph Rouison in company with another party came to O'Brien's Hotel, Georgetown, on the night of Aug. 5th called out Constable King and assaulted him. King gave his assailants such a thrashing that they were glad to get away and will not likely molest him soon again.

DR. CHIVERS lectured in the Baptist church last night to an audience much smaller than was merited. Dr. Chivers is one of the United States ablest preachers, a representative of the international Young Peoples' Union and is the man whom 7000 people delighted to applaud whenever he arose to speak at the Buffalo convention. Rev. C. W. Corey presided and with him on the platform were Rev. A. F. Browne, North River, Rev. G. M. Campbell and Rev. Mr. Corey introduced the speaker in a few exceedingly well chosen remarks. These were followed by a most appropriate welcome from the junior union of the Baptist church. Seven little girls, arose in succession and attached to a wire suspended in front of the pulpit floral letters forming the word "welcome." Dr. Chivers thanked the children most heartily and then gave a stirring address on Young Peoples' Unions elucidating their basal and successive principles of federation, education and service. His hearers were much pleased with the address throughout, at the close of which many had a much clearer knowledge than ever before of the need of the dissemination of Christian knowledge.

REV. G. C. P. PALMER, Bedeque, is one of P. E. Island's clergymen who is interesting himself very deeply in the prohibition campaign. In the different churches in the circuit he has recently expressed himself very strongly, and a sermon which he preached from John iii 20. "He that doeth good cometh to the light. He that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light," is spoken of as one carrying with it rare conviction. In the sermon he referred to the fact that rum-sellers always fear to face the light even in holding public meetings. He then gave a brief resume of the history of the coming plebiscite, pointing out that now all that is asked of the voter is a simple "yes" or "no" vote. Reference was also made to the misrepresentations respecting Dr. Allison's attitude in this matter. Mr. Palmer also spoke forcefully of the strength which a prohibitory law would give to friends of sobriety in working for the advancement of humanity and urged upon his hearers to do all in their power to roll up a sweeping majority for the cause of righteousness.

SIR.—I notice now that the Editor of the Examiner is "taking a hand" in the "naming of the baby."
