WORPLESDON, England, April 26.—Showing the same brilliant golf which enabled her to win the British women's championship three times, Miss Joyce Wethered yesterday breezed through the Surrey women's championship to capture that title for the fourth time.
 Miss Wethered defeated Mrs. Latham Hall, of Guilford, eight up and six to play in the final this afternoon.

Britain Desires Disarmament

(Canadian Press)
 LONDON, April 26.—Premier Baldwin has made it plain that Britain desires to reduce every class of warship, without exception. His response to President Hoover is considered to raise the naval issue to immediate importance. They are tempters who are telling him to make it an electioneering asset. He is told by the Daily Express that he can say to the British people: "I have entered upon discussions with the United States which I hope and believe will dispel not only the fact but the fear of Anglo-American rivalry at sea. Return me to power and I promise not to pause until the insensate misunderstandings of the past two years have been shattered."
 Premier Baldwin, however, is the last politician in England to attempt to make party capital out of Anglo-American relations. There is no substantial difference between the three British parties on this question. Whatever government is returned to power at the next election will favor naval reduction, provided it is consistent with the safety of the British Empire. And if Mr. Baldwin were to agree now to Britain joining the United States in a new naval conference his word would be honored after May 30 by Ramsay MacDonald or Lloyd George if either were prime minister.

Are You in Favor of a Flying Field and Club for this Province?

At a recent meeting of citizens much interest was expressed in the formation of a Flying Club, and the establishment of a Flying Field in this province.
 It was felt that it is certainly desirable that this Province should not fall behind the other provinces in the important and rapidly increasing matter of air transportation, and that our young men should have an opportunity of becoming versed in what will doubtless develop into one of the great industries of Canada.

An organization Committee was appointed to investigate the possibilities of forming such a club, and the Committee feel, that with the assistance of the Dept. of National Defense in offering the free use of two planes, a Flying Club is possible, provided they have the whole-hearted support and interest of the people of the province.

TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE DEPARTMENT'S OFFER A LOCAL FLYING CLUB MUST BE FORMED, AND THE ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE THEREFORE WISH TO SECURE AS QUICKLY AS POSSIBLE THE NAMES OF ALL THOSE WHO ARE WILLING TO SUPPORT THE MOVEMENT, as application must be made to OIAWA without delay, the number of planes available being limited. With this end in view an Application Blank has been inserted on this page, through the courtesy of the "Guardian," which should be completed and returned to the address indicated.

ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP gives the club member the privilege of taking instruction and learning to fly under the tuition of a pilot-instructor provided by the club and approved by the Dept. of National Defense. To secure a private pilot's license it is necessary for the candidate to have put in about twelve hours actual flying time, the first ten of which will be in conjunction with the instructor, and the last two "solo flying." This instruction would probably be spread over a period of three months. The student will pay a fixed rate per hour for the use of the plane during instruction.

ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP entitles such members to fly in the club planes as passengers, with a licensed pilot, at a rate to be fixed by the club.

ONLY MEMBERS OF THE CLUB WILL BE ALLOWED TO USE, OR TRAVEL IN THE PLANES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE REGULATIONS OF THE DEPT. OF NATIONAL DEFENSE.
 We would suggest that all those interested, and willing to support the movement although not desirous of becoming pilots, should take advantage of the Associate Membership.
 The Committee earnestly solicit the support of Summerside, Montague, and other centres throughout the province, as the advantage offered by the club will be available to any member. It is hoped that in due course flying fields will be established at various other points throughout the province.
