NEW FOE OF TIMBER WEALTH DISCOVERED.

OTTAWA, March 1.—A new enemy of the timber wealth of Canada whose ravages are believed to have been more destructive than those of forest fires and who has really accounted for much of the damage blamed on the insect is a bug, and its discoverer is Entomologist Johnson, of the southern section of the Stenzeler exploration party, which returned last fall from the Arctic, after three years in that frigid region.

Curiously enough, though Mr. Johnson is convinced his new insect is responsible for most of the damage to timber in territory comparatively far north, he had to go far north to get his first glimpse of it. It was away up near the shores of the Arctic Ocean, at the farthest limit of tree life in fact, that Mr. Johnson, who is described as the most indefatigable collector of entomological specimens who ever visited the far north, discovered the little pest at its deadly work. After watching it boring away steadily from day to day and carefully noting its habits the entomologist collected a number of specimens of it which he has brought back alive to Ottawa.

A curious thing about the insect is that after it has paid a visit to a forest the latter has all the appearance of growth that has been destroyed by fire. It is thus practically the only real fire bug in existence, and is said to have done more extensive damage than any of its human imitators ever dreamed of.

Mr. Johnson's announcement has caused great interest in scientific circles, and if his contention is proved he will have won fame in the entomological world. However, his fire bug is only one of scores of different insect specimens which he has brought back with him. Other members of the southern party also collected extensively in the fields and the wealth of specimens they secured were distributed for study among various universities in Canada and the United States.

STATES BELIEF

BOSTON, March 1.—Dr. Charles W. Eliot, President Emeritus of Harvard, has written a new statement of the Unitarian belief, which is to be sent broadcast. Some of the cardinal tenets follow:

"We believe in a loving God who inspires and vivifies the universe, and to that God we attribute in an infinite degree all the finest, noblest, sweetest, loveliest qualities which human nature embodies and displays in infinite forms. For us God is not a despotic ruler, a Judge, just or unjust, or a lord of embattled hosts. He is for us a Father Divine; the word rather signifies for us the best human combination of justice; tenderness and intimate sympathy.

"We recognize that there are great evils in the world, but refuse to accept them as inevitable, and intelligent human effort, and with every means which modern science puts in to our hands.

"We believe in the prevention of evil by destroying its spawn and digging up its roots, and in educating and reforming the wrongdoer, rather than merely punishing him.

"We recognize that human wills are often weak and human bodies and minds often defective; but we do not infer therefrom that the human race is depraved and is to be controlled and reformed only by fear or terror.

"We believe that mankind would get along better than they do now if it were positively known that the heaven of Revelations had been burned and hell quenched.

"We believe in the liberties of the field, and accept their testimony to the nature of the God that made them so beautiful, and so capable of enjoying them.

"We believe that to whom much is given, of them much is expected or required; and that the sense of obligation is strongest in a grateful conscience."
