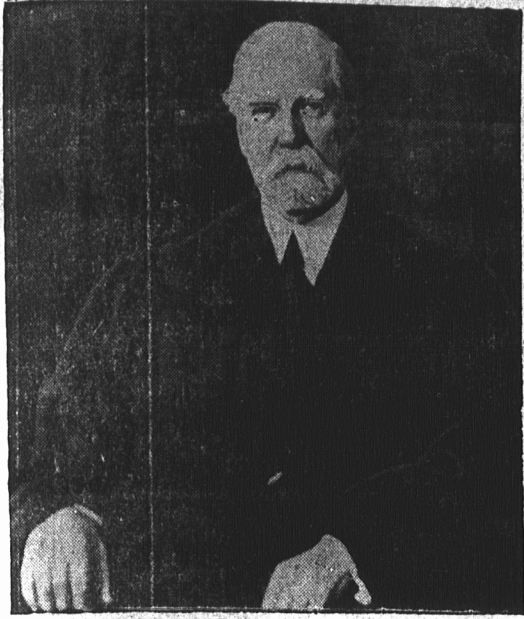


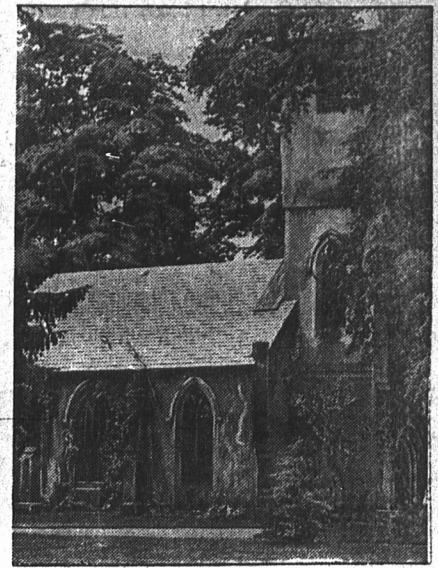

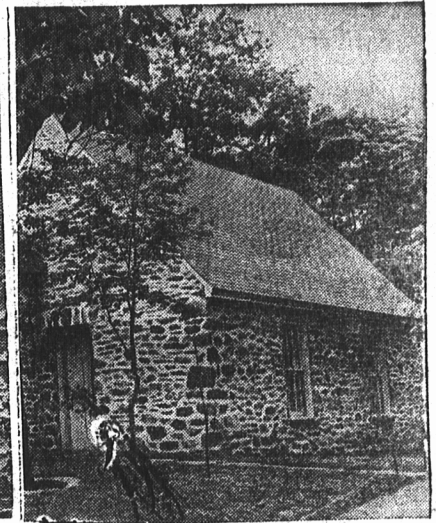

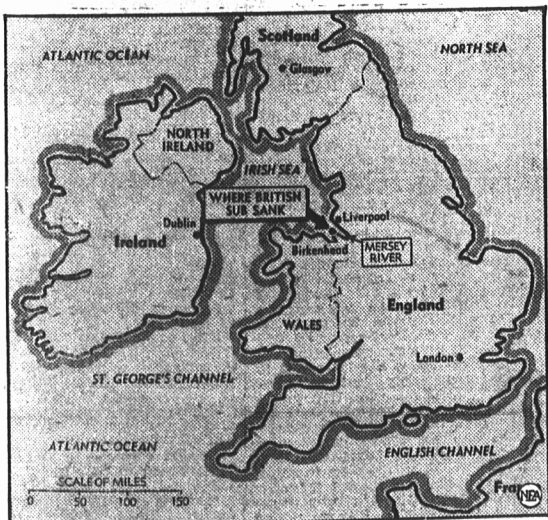

After a luncheon in the Federal Building at the World's Fair comes the inspection of British exhibits, followed by a visit to Columbia University, sometime King's College.
