Contract Bridge

THE VITAL FIRST PLAY

In today's deal, as in so many deals, declarer's play at the first trick determined the final outcome.

North dealer.
North-South vulnerable.

♠ A 4 2
♥ K 10 7
♦ A K 5 2
♣ A J 7

♠ A 10 7 5
♥ A 6 3 2
♦ J 9 4
♣ 8

♠ Q J 6
♥ Q 5 4
♦ 8
♣ Q 10 9 5 4 3

The bidding:
North East South West
1 ♠ Pass 1 NT Pass
3 NT Pass Pass Pass Pass

South responded with one no-trump, despite his distribution, because he did not have the general honor-trick strength for a takeout to two clubs.

West opened his fourth-highest spade. This was ducked in dummy and declarer captured East's eight winners, and East made the excellent play of ducking. On another club lead West showed out, so declarer put up the ace and then made East take his club king.

East returned the spade nine and now, no matter how declarer played, he could not return to his own hand to cash in the three good clubs. The result was that he won, in all, only two spade tricks, one heart, two diamonds and two clubs, and thus suffered a 200-point defeat.

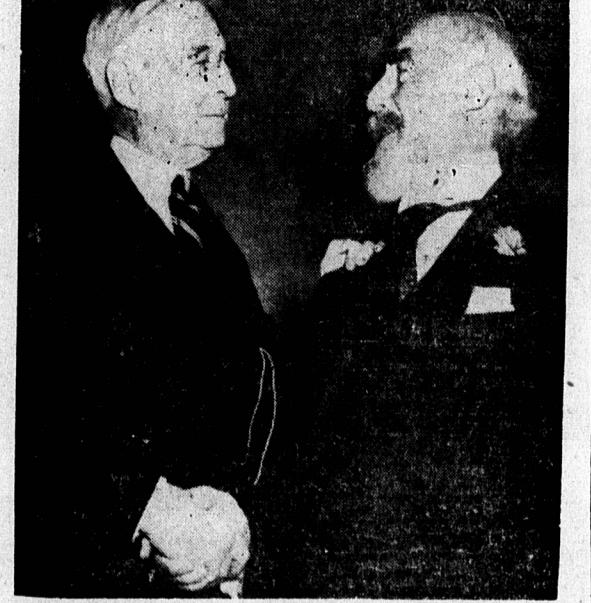
The crux of the play was obviously to set up clubs and make provision for a sure entry to the South hand, so that the clubs could be run after establishment. The right way to insure this plan was to win the opening spade lead with dummy's ace, then to lay down the ace and king a trick to the club king. This jack of clubs, cheerfully surrendered, would leave South with a sure spade entry, and the opponents could not, meanwhile, successfully attack any other suit. Declarer would thus win two spade tricks, two diamonds and five clubs, and would not even need a heart trick for his game contract.

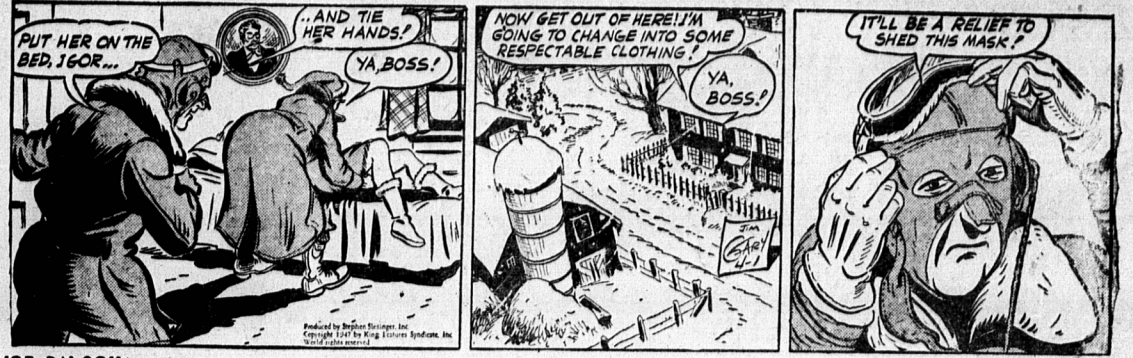
