MORE FIGHTING NOW IMMINENT

Weather Good and Much Skirmishing Going On

Russia Gets American Submarine Boat—Jap Reverse Near Port Arthur Not Confirmed.

MORE FIGHTING IMMINENT. LONDON, July 15—(Special)—Fighting is imminent at Tai Tohe Kiao and Hai Chong. MUCH SKIRMISHING GOING ON. The Japanese have entered six miles south of Tai Tohe Kiao and much skirmishing is taking place. SOME BETTER WEATHER NOW. Some days of fine weather have proved favorable for the movements of troops. The American submarine boat Fulton was said to be at Cronstadt and will be sent.

SKETCH OF S' SIDE CHURCHES.

Special services will be held in the different churches in Summerside tomorrow appropriate to the Homecoming occasion.

Methodist Church

The Wesleyan Methodists about the year 1880 commenced to hold religious services at what was then commonly called Green's shore, and subsequently Summerside. There being no church of any denomination in the place, they occupied the D. S. School House. About that time Joseph Green and wife, taking a deep interest in the moral and spiritual welfare of the people, offered to give them a building lot for the erection of a church which offer was thankfully accepted. In the year 1884 a building committee was formed consisting of William G. Strong, George Donell, Edward Henry and Joseph Green, under the supervision of Rev. Wesley Beals. In 1890 the building was completed and formally opened and dedicated. Rev. John B. Strong and Ingham Sutcliffe preached on the occasion. From that time the following ministers have had charge of the congregations: Revs. Evans, Johnson, DesBrisay, Fulton, Strewbury, Sprague, Berry, Brewer, Hamilton, Betts, Allen, Hamilton, Chappelle, Grantland, McGege, Weddall, Sprague, McLaughlin, and the present pastor, McCully. In the year 1888, as the result of the Conference held in the city of Belleville, Ont., by which a union of the several branches of the Methodist church was consummated, the Bible Christian Church in Summerside and the Methodist Church united; the Methodist building was dispensed with, (it is now used as a carriage shop) and worship was afterwards held in the Bible Christian Church until the present splendid new Methodist Church was built and the old Bible Christian (Methodist) church is now used as a hall, and known as Epworth Hall.

ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH. The first church of the above denomination was built in Summerside in 1854 on the ground which is now the beautiful garden of R. T. Holman. Very Rev. James McDonald, Vicar General, was the first pastor on the Indian River parish at that time. After the church was held services in Summerside once every four weeks. The church was used as a place of worship until 1874. In the meantime the present brick edifice of St. Paul's had been commenced in 1865, and in 1870 it was finally finished. In 1899 Rev. Jas. A. McKenna succeeded Vicar General McDonald as pastor. He was in turn succeeded by Rev. Dr. Doyle, Rev. D. J. G. McDonald and the present pastor Rev. J. O. McLean.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND. St. Mary's Church was built in 1861. It has always been attached to St. John's Church, St. Eleanora's which was built about 1828. The first rector was Rev. Dr. Jenkins, who was succeeded in turn by the following clergymen:—Revs. Dr. Walker, Dr. Wiggins, Dr. Brad, J. W. Forsyth, M. A., T. B. McLean, Teophtilus R. Ohey, Klement Richardson, M. A., O. F. Lowe, S. A. C., Dr. Osbourne, J. M. Withycombe, T. C. Mellor, and the present rector W. B. Sissam.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. The Presbyterian Church was built in the year 1861. At that time there were only about six Presbyterian families in Summerside. The committee who had charge of superintending the building of the church was composed of R. Glover, Thos. Brehant, James Malcolm and Colin McLennan. At that time the congregation was under the control of the church at Lot 16. Rev. F. W. Frame (later for some time editor of the Island Guardian) was the first pastor. He was inducted into the charge of Lot 16 and Summerside churches in 1862. About 1871 the Summerside section severed its connection with the Lot 16 church and became a self-sustaining congregation. The following clergymen have since had charge:—Revs. Nell McKay, Gerritor, E. M. Dill, Dr. W. H. Smith. The church is at present without a pastor.

BAPTIST CHURCH. The Baptist church was organized in Summerside May 27th, 1868 with seven members, Rev. M. P. Freeman, pastor; Stephen Baker, Clerk; Isaac Howatt and Stephen Baker, Deacons. The following are the names of the ministers who have labored in this church:—Revs. F. Kidson, J. B. McDonald, M. D., E. F. Fisher, J. A. Durkee, J. A. Simpson, J. Murray, W. B. Hinson, A. H. Livers, H. H. Hall, L. A. Palmer, Jos. Cahill, Bentley, W. H. Robinson, Grant, E. P. Calder. At present Rev. McKillop is filling the pastorate. A call has been extended to Rev. Mr. [Name obscured]
