"We Shall Carry On: We Have Our King Still With Us"

The London woman who wrote these words in a letter to the Queen's Canadian Fund headquarters has been twice bombed out of her home. Yet she counts herself among the more fortunate. For she and her family have been enabled to find another home by a grant from the Lord Mayor's Fund, the organization through which the Queen's Fund operates in England's bombed areas.

There is no hint of discouragement in her story, no suggestion of defeat from this woman who has twice lost her home and all her possessions. There is, once again, only that familiar determination to win through, the will not to let the others down.

But there is also the modest admission that "we are a little bomb weary at times, and we all have to work very hard."

Nobody can help but admire the courage of this London woman, and of the many thousands who have suffered likewise. Yet perhaps we might well consider whether we have not come to take their courage for granted. We read of it now so often that we may well be led to assume too easily that such a spirit cannot be broken by any terror or by any frightfulness.

We must not allow ourselves to be so persuaded. One has only to read of the gratitude of those who have been helped by the Lord Mayor's Fund to know of the great service that has been done to help the distressed. But the need of that service continues and will continue. They do not need our tacit admiration. They need encouragement, and sympathy, and help, and they will need them as long as they stay at their posts in the front line.

Those who give to the Queen's Fund are helping them in mind and body. They need to know that we care, as much as they need the necessities of life which the Fund is furnishing to those whose need is greatest.
