THE PROHIBITORY LAW.

On Wednesday next, fifth of June, the prohibitory law will go into effect in the City of Charlottetown, and thereafter the traffic in intoxicating liquors will be unlawful. At present, as has been the case for years past, the Canada Temperance Act is in force in the three counties of the Island, so that the provincial act for bidding the sale in this City completes the extension of prohibition throughout the entire Province. This condition is not new, except in the sense that the provincial law is new, for the entire Island was, years ago, under the operation of the C. T. A.

Prince County adopted the Canada Temperance Act in 1878, King's and Charlottetown in 1879 and Queen's County in 1880. The counties have steadfastly adhered to their first decision. In Charlottetown unsuccessful attempts were made to repeal the Act in 1884, when it was reaffirmed by a majority of 40, and in 1887 when the majority for the Act was 20. In 1891 a majority of 14 was obtained against the Act and it was repealed, but was brought in again in 1894 when the majority for the Act was 22. In 1897 another successful attempt was made to repeal the Canada Temperance Act, the majority being 113. Since that date down to the present the liquor traffic has been legalised in Charlottetown.

It will be seen from the above brief record that while the counties have long stood by the principle of prohibition so far as it is expressed by the C. T. Act, the City of Charlottetown has been divided, but in four times out of six when the Act was submitted to popular vote a majority was found in its favor. We doubt not that at the present time a majority of the citizens of Charlottetown, and a much larger proportion of the people of the Province desire the entire suppression of the liquor trade here and throughout the Island.

The new Prohibitory Law, being a provincial Act, has necessarily some limitations, inasmuch as it is not in the power of our Legislature to control the import trade. But it is to be observed that the Canada Temperance Act does not prohibit importation of intoxicants, and the prohibitory law of the State of Maine, one of the most effective that we know of, is subject to the same limitation in that regard as the law now to come into force here. The main object of the law will be attained if the retail traffic is suppressed, and for this object we believe the law will afford an efficient instrument if vigilantly and energetically enforced, as we trust and believe it will be.

The penalties for violation of the new law will be found much more severe than those of the Scott Act, being \$100 fine for a first and \$200 for a second offence, with proportionate terms of imprisonment in case of default, and for a third offence imprisonment for six months without the option of a fine. We are informed and believe that it is the intention of the Government to energetically carry out the law, and we are assured that in doing so they will be backed up by the honest and law-abiding people of the Province. We trust that those now engaged in the sale of liquor will bow to the law, which though contrary to their feelings and interests, embodies the sentiment of the great majority of the people.

of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. Sir Henry Strong, Chief Justice of Canada now has a seat on the Judicial Committee when Canadian appeals are being tried, but it is now proposed that Canada and Australia shall each hereafter have a permanent representative on the committee who shall reside in London. The position will be an eminent one, and the despatch to the Montreal Witness mentions that the only two names so far mentioned for it are those of Sir Louis Davies and Solicitor General Fitzpatrick. We are therefore left in doubt as to what elevation Sir Louis may attain to in his next step upward.
