Toronto Exchange New York Stock Exchange

TORONTO, Feb. 12 (CP)—Nervous holders offered stocks at dropping prices again today and all price indexes were down to new low levels for the year. The golds closed at their lows since 1933, taking a loss for the day of .69. The Industrials weakened .87 and in the index, the western oils .53 and the base metals .15.

Trading picked up as prices touched new lows and the day's turnover of 181,000 shares was the heaviest in a month. Hollinger was off 15 cents to its low for years at 8 7/8 and other stocks losing 10 to 15 cents were Home Share, Cheserville, Delme, Hallnor and Sigm. The close was down 4 to 8 cents for Anson, Lamque, Little Long Lac, Macassa, MacCockshutt, O'Brien, Peron, Pickle Crow and Teck Hughes. Preston sold in volume at a loss of 4 cents to 2.75.

Nickel, Hudson Bay and Smelt-ore and finished unchanged and Noranda was down 1-2 for small lots. Steep Rock sold in quality at a loss of 8 cents to 1.37 and Sherwin, Normal and Adelmac had small losses.

Food, utility, liquor and steel issues supplied the losses that tilted the industrial share index down. Declines were mainly in small fractions for the interlisted leaders, including Brazilian, Canada A. Canadian Industrial Alcohol, A. Cockshutt, Dominion Foundries, Fanny Farmer, International Pete, Laura Secord, Loblaw and Walkers.

Home Oil tumbled 17 cents to 2.30. Other western oils posted minor losses. Anglo-Canadian, Calgary and Edmonton, Commonwealth Pete, Dalhousie and British-Dominion displayed mild weakness.
