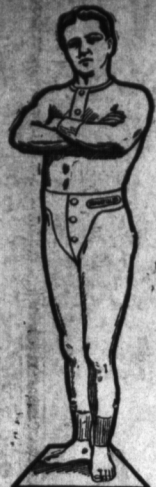

In a published letter regarding life saving stations F. W. Hyndman has the following to say:—"In my humble opinion the best results would be obtained by the placing in each of the following railway stations, a fully equipped life boat with means of speedy removal to any point on the coast where it may be required, and each boat to be supplied with a complete rocket apparatus:—Souris, St. Peters, Charlottetown, Ellerslie and Tignish. These in my opinion are the most suitable places. I mention Charlottetown more particularly because here a special train can always be had, which is not the case at other points. If a station be erected on the coast, it may happen to be the furthest away place when an accident occurs. Each boat should have a captain or a coxswain, or whatever you like to call him, whose duty it shall be to have a run once a month to some place on the coast in summer time for the purpose of drill—and at or near each station there should be a man in charge of the rocket apparatus. The pay might be merely nominal except when actually employed or at drill."
