OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 8. —(Eggs) —The undertone of eastern egg markets is weaker in sympathy with United States markets. Toronto dealers are paying extras 50, firsts 45, seconds 30 to 32 delivered wholesale extras 60, firsts 55, seconds 37. Montreal—Fresh eggs market weakening. Dealers are reported paying for local whites have commenced to arrive extras 60, firsts 50, pullet extras 45, seconds 40, delivered. Vancouver—Prices unchanged. Two cars leaving for Prairies selling price 47, firsts 45, seconds 43. Victoria jobbing extras 43, firsts 41, pullet extras 39. St. John—Eggs are arriving in fairly large quantities with fair demand. Dealers paying extras 55, firsts 51 and selling extra 57, firsts 53.

MONTREAL, Que. Jan. 9. — Extreme dullness marked the local and export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market Saturday. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat grades of flour were well maintained under a quiet demand. The milled market was fairly active and values ruled firm. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was quiet and prices were steady. An active business was transacted in eggs and the undertone to the market continued easy. The receipts were 997 cases. A feature of the butter trade on Saturday was the announcement that jobbing prices for finest creamery butter could be one cent per pound higher at 43 c per pound in solid packages, and 41 c per pound in one pound blocks owing to the continued strength in the wholesale market. Predicts Another Earthquake

Great Seismologist Says It Will Be More Disastrous Than That Which Devastated Armenia

LENNINGROD, Jan. 8. —The prediction that a far more terrible earthquake than that which devastated Armenia last May, may occur there at any time, was made today by Russia's greatest seismologist Professor Nickiforov. The professor said that Leningrad, centre of the last violent disturbance, was in a vast amplitude of volcanic action, that seismic layers have been loosened and that the subterranean rock and earth, seeking to find a level, would cause convulsions for months. No less than 53 shocks have been recorded in Armenia since November 22nd, keeping the population in a state of alarm.

NO PROSPECT OF SIR JOHN MACDONALD'S HOME BECOMING PROPERTY OF CONSERVATIVES

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 8. —There is small likelihood of "Earscliffe" the Ottawa home of Sir John Macdonald, when he was prime minister, becoming in the near future the property of the Conservative party as a home for its leader, as suggested by Hon. Charles Murphy, in a letter to local papers yesterday. "Earscliffe is not for sale," said Dr. Charles A. E. Harris, the present owner. "I value the house and the precious memories of my dear wife and then the memories of Sir John Macdonald, which are more precious than gold. One doesn't sell one's soul for money." Dr. Harris said that he had received letters from all parts of the world inquiring into the ownership of "Earscliffe." "I have even had to write to the London Times denying that my home was for sale. The thing is expiring."

White Star Line to Make Further Test of Halifax Port

MONTREAL, Jan. 8. —The White Star liner Megantic, following a winter cruise, will make one trip from Liverpool to Halifax, with the latter port the western terminal instead of Portland. Leaving the English port April 8, the ship follows the successful experiment made with the Regina last year.

It was stated here today that if the Megantic trip proves successful it will be probable more White Star ships would use Halifax.

Last year on the Regina trip three times as much cargo was taken on as the 'volunteer' while thousands of dollars were spent in stevedoring charges.

Banks Hold Fortune In Unclaimed Funds

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. — A neat fortune in unclaimed savings lies in the vaults of New York Banks awaiting trace of depositors.

The names of "floaters" the world over, from diverging sources and in varying amounts, add to the total which, in one bank alone, has climbed to six figures.

Hundreds of depositors have visited banks never to return. They have left their savings and gone possibly to death, without leaving record of their moves.

Helps Hard To Find Owners and heirs to this fortune are hard to find, says Herbert K. Twitchell, president of the Seaman's Bank for Savings, which, in 100 years of business, has 2,536 dormant accounts totalling \$296,938.67.

The task, however, is a never-ending one and through a department, instituted for the purpose, constant search is made and every possibility of a claimant exhausted.

The Seaman's bank is one of many in New York all of which have similar accounts whose depositors have not been heard of in 20 years or more. After this lapse the accounts become "legally dormant" interest no longer is paid and the banks have use of the money, but not for individual gain.

Accounts From The Bowersy

Montagu Norman to Visit New York

(Special to the Guardian) NEW YORK, Jan. 8. —Montagu Norman, Governor of the Bank of England, is expected to visit New York shortly and confer with Benjamin Strong, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank and other financiers. Several such conferences have been held the last few years both in this country and abroad at which international financial affairs have been discussed in an informal way.

Although the purpose of Mr. Norman's forthcoming visit has not been revealed it is considered possible that it may have to do with closing out the \$30,000,000 credits which were created in April, 1925, in connection with the return of Great Britain to the gold standard. A credit of \$200,000,000 was obtained at the time by the Bank of England from the Federal Reserve Bank, which acts as its correspondent here, and the British Government obtained a credit of \$100,000,000 from U. P. Morgan and Company its fiscal agents in this country.

Although no announcements have been made regarding the credits since their establishment it has been taken for granted in financial circles that Great Britain has called any part of them into use. The credits were obtained as a precaution agreement. With the progress recently made by Great Britain it is believed the credits may no longer be considered necessary.
