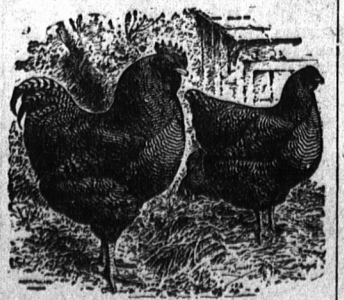

GERMANS ROB TREASURE IN RUSSIAN PALACE.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 30.—The famous Palace of Villanov, near Warsaw has been despoiled of all its treasures, not sacked by a mob of soldiers, but by a Berlin museum official named Erdmann, with the sanction of the Military Governor, General von Beseler. The palace, built in 1678 to 1694, contained thousands of Polish relics. Crates after crates were sent away addressed to Berlin, packed with ancient armor, swords, personal effects of Jan III, Turkish flags captured during the Ottoman raid, Court correspondence between Austria and Poland during Jan's reign, Michael Angelo's statuette of Moses, numerous portraits of Polish Royalties and other notable pictures, parchments and books. Erdmann announced he intended next to clear out Warsaw palaces and museums. The Poles are infuriated, and Russians, stigmatize this as one of the most cold-blooded thefts of the war.

HAPPENINGS OF THE WEEK

General French, whose name is a household word, celebrated his 63rd birthday on Tuesday of this week. Victory for the allies came on the eve of it and the Field Marshal's Headquarters were completely swamped with a flood of congratulatory messages.

The English mail this week was laden with letters and souvenirs from "the boys at the front" and in England. The very best of spirits prevailed even with those in the thickest of the fray and the only laments expressed are that tobacco and sweets are somewhat scarce.

There are many signs that the social life of the coming winter is to be dominated by the war note and there will be little entertaining that does not take on the guise of patriotic activity. There are rumors of several patriotic bridges and dances, while the different sewing societies of last winter are now getting to work and sewing bees are again the popular mode of entertaining.

Quite a lot of interest centres around the visit of Miss Holdsworth of Port Hope, Ont., who is to visit here next week the guest of Mrs. Peake. Miss Holdsworth, who is at present in Halifax, was one of a party of five Canadian ladies who were in Freiburg, Germany last fall when the war broke out, and who were sent out to Baden Baden, where for three weeks they were kept prisoners, limited to walk and speech, before they were allowed to cross the border into Switzerland. Miss Holdsworth was prostrated after her return to Canada owing to the severe strain under which she passed and could not talk of her experience. It is understood, however, that while here she will give a talk on this interesting topic to which the public may have the pleasure of listening.

Mr. and Mrs. James Hegan their two daughters and two sons are closing their residence in Charlottetown, and will spend the coming winter with Mr. Hegan's sister, Miss Eliza Hegan, Pitt street, St. John. One son, who was manager of a bank in Chatham, is now on the Bank of Nova Scotia staff in St. John. A third son has joined one of the Canadian battalions for overseas service.

ALL ABLE BODIED SERBIANS IN ARMY

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—Serbia has an army of about 600,000 men in the field to resist invasion of that country by the Teutonic allies, according to information received by the Serbian agricultural relief committee from Professor Dosatch, of the University of Belgrade. The Professor estimates that Serbia has lost about 120,000 men since the war began and that about one in every five who were wounded died. The army includes, he says, practically all able bodied men between the ages of 18 and 60 years.

CALGARY PAPERS PAY TRIBUTE TO THE MACKENZIE BROTHERS DROWNED IN RED RIVER

The above reproductions of photos of the MacKenzie brothers appeared in Calgary papers a short time ago. They were sons of the late John C. MacKenzie of the Registry Office of this City; their home being in Long Creek where they were well and favorably known.

Twelve years ago the elder brother Archie went to the Canadian West and had been very successful as a contractor being a member of the firm MacLeod, Barrack and MacKenzie who constructed the Afton and Avonlea apartments besides several residences in the city. He was joined by his brother John some years later and the outlook for the two brothers looked bright until the swift running waters of the Red Deer River claimed them as victims.

They had gone to erect an elevator on the Bassano Express branch of the Canadian Pacific, and the elder brother Archie together with some companions went for an evening bathe in the river when he got into a deep hole he was caught in the swift

current and carried down stream, when his brother Jack saw the accident and against the warning of his friends jumped in and in a brave but futile attempt at rescue lost his own life also.

The City of Calgary sent three men and the Mounted Police also assisted in trying to find the bodies, which were not recovered until after several days search. The remains were brought to Calgary where they were buried in the city of their adoption; three of their sisters, Mabel, Rachel and Ida, (Mrs. Cogill) being present. The services were conducted by their pastor the Rev. Mr. Wishart of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church of which the two brothers were members. There were many wreaths and flowers testifying to the esteem in which they were held. There are left to mourn one brother, Hector, and two sisters, Elsie and Jean on the old homestead at Long Creek, Rotha (Mrs. Stretch) in Saskatchewan; Ida (Mrs. Cogill) in Montana; Mabel and Rachill in Calgary.
