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TO CUT U. S. ARMY TO 220,000
 Reduction of the enlisted strength of the army from its present number of 220,000 to about 150,000 with deep cuts in administrative expenditures and elimination of wastefulness are the steps to be taken by the Republican Administration in cutting down army expenses. Representative Ian R. Anthony, of Kansas, member of the House Military Affairs Committee, after a lengthy conference with President-elect Harding outlined the policy of Republican economy as it relates to the army establishment. In carrying out the plan of the new Administration to save \$1,000,000,000, the cost of the army will have to be reduced by \$250,000,000. Commanded by General Sir. H. C. O. Plumer.

FLOODED THE U. S. WITH WET GOODS—In the arrest in a room on the seventeenth floor of the Hotel McAlpin, New York, of two men and two women, the U. S. Government believes it has struck close to the centre of the racket.
