The story is that Mr. Sutherland who had been operating around the silver-lined fields of Cobalt for several months with more or less success left recently for the gold fields of Rawhide Nevada, to which place he had been attracted by tales of fortune made in a day. Shortly after his arrival there he struck a pay streak, a company was formed of which he is president and Mr. Sutherland now stands to make a couple of millions. As an illustration of the richness of the claim in which he is interested it is stated that the first ten tons of quartz that came out of the mine averaged \$800 to the ton at the smelter.

Owing to the rain, the track events of the Olympic trials at Halifax Saturday afternoon had to be postponed. Baird, of Fredericton, having met with an accident, could not be present, and as the only field event in which there were two entries was the running hop, step and jump, this was held, and in which Dr. Garfield McDonald, New Glasgow, established a new Maritime record. His performance was 44 ft. 2 1/2 inches. This is also believed to be a Canadian amateur record, as it is thought that the jump of 42 ft. 10 inches by Worthington at the Toronto Olympic trials Saturday a week ago is the best previous mark. McDonald jumped 44.9 in practice before making his official trial. H. W. Flemming, W. A. C., his opponent, made the splendid record of 42 ft. 4 in., or but 6 inches less than the Ontario record. Both McDonald and Flemming beat the performance at the trials at Montreal Saturday, in which the winner's record was 40 ft. 6 1/2 inches. These men are known to the athletes of this Province who have contested with them on various occasions.

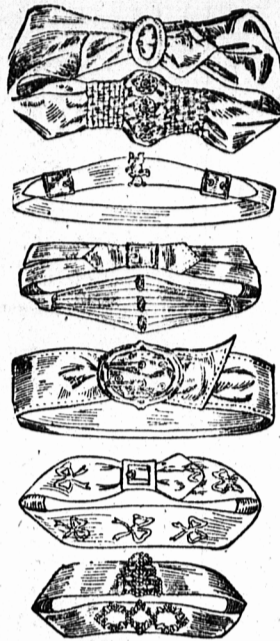
