Local and Other Notes

Gleaned by the Morning Guardian Reporters.

About 300 boxes cheese arrived here yesterday from the Dank River dairy station. At the Police Court yesterday morning Charles Vaughan was fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness. Mr. F. Liddin, the well-known commercial traveller, arrived in the city yesterday evening. On Saturday next an assault and battery case from Badalbone will be heard before J. T. Mellish, J. P. Rev. P. J. Hogan was a passenger by the S. Lawrence yesterday evening on his way home from Montreal. The Scott Act case against George Pippy came up yesterday before Stipendiary Magistrate. It was adjourned till Monday, the 17th inst. At a meeting of the Law Students Society yesterday afternoon Mr. Arthur Mellish was elected president vice Mr. Percy Carver resigned. The same four councillors met again yesterday evening and the same three councillors stayed away, in consequence the meeting did not materialize. Five lots of cheese of two boxes each were shipped yesterday for the exhibition at Toronto, Ontario. There were also three lots shipped for the exhibition at Ottawa. The court house at Bonshaw will probably be filled at the door next Saturday evening, the occasion being a concert to be given by the Baptists of that place. The program which is a varied one contains every promise of a literary and musical treat being provided. A very fair number attended the Milton tea yesterday and they came away well satisfied with the event. Everything passed off quietly and satisfactorily. Many were the comments of praise bestowed upon the music furnished by the 82nd Battalion band. Two More.—The enterprising firm of R. E. Carver, of Pownal, Law Student with Messrs Davies & Hazard, leaves tomorrow morning to attend the Boston Law School. A farewell party was given in his honor last night at the residence of Mr. John Smith, Pownal. Toasts, etc., were the order of the evening. Mr. Carver leaves with the good wishes of many friends. This County Court met again yesterday. In the suit of George E. Barry vs Joseph Copp, a settlement was effected between the parties. Peter Halloran vs John MacNeill, judgment was reserved. Judge Alley dismissed the suit brought by the Provincial Treasurer against E. B. Eddy, the defendant having been sued by his initials. Court adjourned until to-day. G. FRANK BEER, Esq., returned yesterday evening from Yarmouth, N. S. where he had been for some days with his mother during her last illness. Mr. Beer had arrived in Yarmouth from England several days ago. He left his mother in apparently better health, but on reaching Pointe-a-Chene, he received a telegram announcing her death. He and Mr. W. W. Beer were this morning for Summerside, whence the funeral of their mother proceeds to Beddque. Her many friends will be pained to hear that Mrs. John Beer, the respected mother of Messrs W. W. and G. F. Beer, of this city, died yesterday afternoon at the home of her son-in-law, Rev. T. J. Deinetadt, Yarmouth, N. S. The deceased had been ill for several days, but her condition had improved on Tuesday, and her relatives in Charlottetown were shocked to hear of her death yesterday morning. The funeral will take place this evening from Lower Beddque upon arrival of steamer from Summerside. Mr. Lewis of the Registry, appeared before John T. Mellish, J. P. for Prince County, charged by a young lad named Merchant with assault and battery on August 15th. The facts as shown by the evidence were as follows: Young Merchant accompanied by a companion went out for a swim off Lewis' place. Scott Act Cases

ANGUS McDONALD'S CASE. A

MICHAEL PRUNTY, (Sworn)—I was into Angus McDonald's with Joseph Conway, between Aug. 4th and Sept. 1st. Conway gave me some of the money and I got some beer which we drank in the yard. I don't know whether that beer had any effect on me or not, because I was drunk before going in. I did not notice it have any effect on Conway, nor don't know whether he was drunk or sober when he commenced drinking it. I had some beer before that at McDonald's and Conway was not with me. I bought no liquor there between those dates. Conway told me he got drunk on that beer. He did not say he was into Hughes' (simple produced) The beer I got tasted something similar to the sample. I was pretty full myself when Conway and I parted, and don't know whether he was drunk or not. I drank nowhere else that day but at McDonald's, so that if I was drunk it must have been McDonald's beer that made me so. I was drunk before I went in for the beer for Conway. It was what I got first that intoxicated me.

HENRY McEWEN (Sworn)—I remember the day that Conway and Prunty were hauling coal. I saw them both coming out of the lane of Capt. John Hughes' yard. It was probably about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Prunty had a flask in his hand and was scarcely able to get into the cart. It was the same day they were hauling the coal, Conway asked me to get some beer for them, and I got a half gallon at McDonald's. I did not drink any as it was too sour. They drank it out in the lane. I did not see them drinking out of the flask.

ANGUS McDONALD (Sworn)—I am the defendant. I always sold Conway either lager beer or Wheatley's hop bitter. Beer from which this sample was taken, when they take it out in cans I give them the latter. It was sold to me as non-intoxicating. Believing it to be such I sold it openly. I would not have sold had I thought it intoxicating. It is specified on the invoices as non-alcoholic.

The case was then adjourned till Monday for the evidence of another witness.

The adjourned cases against P. S. Brown and P. P. Gillis were further adjourned till next Wednesday when judgment will be given.
