TELEPHONE MANNERS IN DENMARK IMPROVED

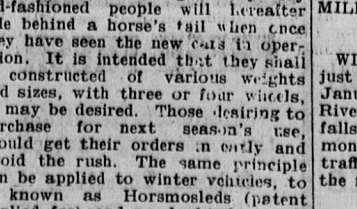
