FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Mr. H. W. Turner, Saturday afternoon to the People's Cemetery was largely attended. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Glenning, assisted by Rev. Dr. Fullerton. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Isaac Carter, E. T. Higgs, W. A. Heustis, John A. Jolly and W. S. Louson.

PRESENTATION.—At the close of the service in the Presbyterian Church Marie, on Xmas evening, the pastor Rev. J. M. MacLeod was presented with an address and a purse of \$100 in gold, from the three sections of St. Peter's Bay congregation, as a token of appreciation of his services. On the occasion, Mr. Judson Webster, Chairman of the Board of Managers, presided in his usual efficient manner; Mr. R. R. Webster, Sec'y-Treas. of the congregation, read a splendid address expressing the esteem and good wishes of the people, and Mr. Evelyn Webster made the presentation in a happy manner. Mr. MacLeod made a suitable reply, expressing his great appreciation of the complimentary address and the gift that accompanied it. This was followed by an address accompanied by a handsome sum of money to Mrs. MacLeod, from the two Auxiliaries of Marie and Greenwich. The address was read by Mrs. Frankman Bowley, and the presentation made by Mrs. R. R. Webster. Mrs. MacLeod, who was taken by surprise, replied thanking the donors for their kind remembrance and good wishes. After a few happy speeches, from the Chairman and others the meeting closed by singing "Blest be the tie that binds."

MEMORIAL BURSARY. — The students of Pine Hill Theological college, Halifax, N. S., are endeavoring to raise \$7,000 in order to establish seven Memorial Bursaries of \$1,000 each to the memory of the theological students of that college who gave their lives in the great war. Pine Hill College has had a proud record in the war. Among the very first to enlist in the city of Halifax during the autumn of 1914 was a band of about eighteen students of that college. These were later followed by every physically fit man of the Institution. Seven of these lads were killed in action. The college has received a great inspiration which the students wish kept in lasting remembrance. This they feel can be done most effectively by means of the Memorial Bursaries. These bursaries are worth \$50 each per year and this amount will be paid annually to students for the Ministry who need financial assistance. Each Bursary will always be named after one of these lads who have made the supreme sacrifice. One of the students belonged to, Prince Edward Island and our share therefore will be one thousand dollars. The Presbyterian churches of the Province have all received special envelopes and literature on the subject and it is felt that a very generous response will be made to this worthy cause. SMELT FISHING.—Parties from Tryon and Victoria report the smelt fishing exceptionally good this season, the catch being the largest in several years. They are being shipped to the Boston and New York markets.

SCARLET AND GOLD.—Scarlet and Gold is the appropriate title of the first Annual issued by the North West Mounted Police Veterans Association and which is henceforth to be issued yearly. The editor in chief, Mr. R.G. McBoth, a War Veteran, is to be congratulated not only on the original historical matter presented but on the excellence of the contributions from other writers. The Annual contains historic and descriptive matter concerning this, the most picturesque arm of the Canadian Government service. Five views of scenes and incidents with which the R. N. W. M. P. were associated and excellent photographs of the present and former officers are given. Among these are photographs of Mr. A. A. McLean, of the R. N. W. M. P., the "LaNauze Patrol", showing Inspector LaNauze who recently visited this city, and his square of five men, together with the two Eskimo murderers whom they arrested after a search of about two years in the frozen north. A sketch is also given of the late Hon. David Laird, Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, who negotiated the treaty with the different Indian tribes and whom the Indians called "the man who talked straight." An excellent autographed photograph of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales is given as a frontispiece. The annual is a valuable and most interesting brochure giving much information concerning a body of men whose great work for North Western Canada lies at the very foundation of Canadian history.

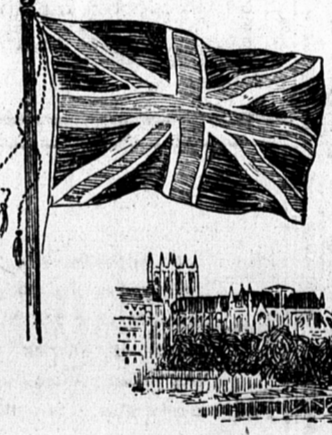
