U.S. GOVT. CROP REPORT.

TORONTO, July 14.—The U. S. Government crop report, issued yesterday, showed the following estimates: Winter wheat production, 569,000,000 bush., yield per acre 14.9 bush.; spring wheat production, 248,000,000, yield per acre 13.3, all wheat production 817,000,000, yield per acre 14.4; corn production, 2,860,000,000, yield per acre, 27.7; oats production, 1,187,000,000, yield per acre, 28.4; barley production, 182,000,000, yield per acre 24.1; rye production 82,000,000, yield per acre 15.9; flax production 10,700,000, yield per acre, 8; hay production 107,000,000 tons, yield per acre, 1.14.

Wheat remaining on farms July 1, 1922, 31,641,000 bush., 56,707,000 bush. July 1, 1921, and 33,442,000 bush., being a five-year average.

The estimate of wheat compares with a total of 855,000,000 a month ago and 795,000,000 harvested last year.

PONTIFF FIRES COOK WHO TRIES TO CHEAT

MILAN, July 14.—Pope Pius XI. has excommunicated from the company of his domestic servants the cook who had been with him during his tenure of office in Bologna, Milan and at the Vatican.

Pope XI, whose simple domestic habits are discussed by the Roman Press, is in the habit of paying for each meal as he takes it, just as he would do in a restaurant, thus facilitating the keeping of his household accounts.

Recently on a bill presented to him by the faithful cook was an item for a chicken priced at 20 lire, of this the Pope had eaten only one-half, and he therefore gave instructions that the remaining half should be served up as chicken croquettes. The croquettes appeared at the same price of 20 lire.

At this the Papal sense of decency was greatly shocked and the cook was sent for and dismissed.

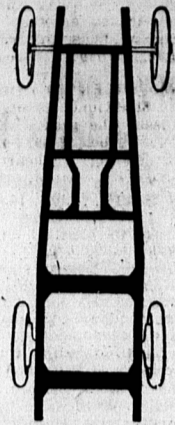
U. F. O. WHIP LOSES SON.
