## Ships That Pass In The Night

Day by day we see our great majestic ships, the Leviathans of the deep, come and go with their burdens of precious lives, their cargoes of rich merchandise, and we are filled with admiration at their perfectness of build and wonderful efficiency, but very seldom do we think of those other sister ships that pass in the night, those silent mysterious ships seen from time to time, and no man can tell from whence they have come and whither they are going. From the earliest times it is recorded that they have been seen, sometimes as a phantom sailing slowly and again as a burning ship seemingly at anchor, sending up a steady flame discernible for many miles, those mysterious night visitants are thought to presage some great disaster at sea, such was the case we read when time after time a ship on fire was seen off the coast of Spain many long years ago, and in many parts of the old world history has recorded such phenomenon. In countless cases the rugged coast of Scotland has seen many ships pass in the night, and the fatal coasts of Anticosti and Newfoundland have also held them. And on the Island of Prince Edward that gem set in the midst of the sea, old timers used to tell of a ghostly nocturnal visitant at East Point, also at the North Shore of the Island, where so many fine ships were wrecked years ago. At the extreme western part it was sighted on more than one occasion, and in that long ago a respected resident of Burnt Point, near Georgetown, the late Bernard Gillis, grandfather of John Hanson, the present occupant of the Gillis homestead, used periodically to see a burning ship out in the gulf, and again sometime in the early days of the S. S. Northern Lights ice breaking activities between Georgetown and Pictou, a phantom steam ship lighted from bow to stern and with engines plainly heard working, entered Georgetown harbor and when opposite St. Andrews Point suddenly disappeared. The authenticity of this was I believe, vouched for by two such reputable citizens as the late Joseph Fairchild and William Dziel, who happened to be on the wharf at the time. For long afterwards much apprehension was felt for the safety of the ice breaker, as it was considered a "forerunner" but nothing untoward happened and the good ship Northern Light weathered every gale and with her gallant crew came safely through every ice pack and jam, although at times it was tough and go.

Yet again not so long ago, perhaps ten or twelve years, the tale was told that several Georgetown men went out one April morning very early, while it was yet dark, to the lobster fishing grounds, and while waiting for the dawn, to run their lines, a large steam ship appeared all lighted up; and plainly discernible were the figures moving to and fro. The ship was coming straight towards them and in a great hurry they scurried out of her way, only to find when they looked around that no ship was to be seen, only an expanse of dark waters. Nor was this an idle tale for the men who related it were well known and most reliable. Nothing happened to them or their boat at the time or afterwards, so we find that every appearance of a phantom ship does not portend disaster. Why then do the ghostly visitants appear? It has always been a mystery and will always remain such, the master minds of science with all their boasted knowledge cannot explain it, but may it not be that the wraiths of the many gallant men who have gone down with their noble ships into the deep waters, still love to patrol the familiar paths of the sea. To those of us who believe that but a thin veil separates the spirit world from ours it does not seem unexplainable. A. L. S.


