DRUNKEN DRIVER SENT TO JAIL---A man charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor was sentenced to 60 days in jail by Magistrate Tweedy yesterday. It was a second offense.

POLICE COURT---Ralph Condon of Charlottetown yesterday was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin, K. C. He was convicted of uttering a worthless cheque. Ernest Praught, also of Charlottetown, pleaded guilty to a charge of obtaining money by means of a worthless cheque and was remanded until Friday for sentence. A vagrant was sent to jail for 30 days and a second vagrant remanded until Friday.

SAFE BROKEN OPEN---A safe, weighing 125 pounds, was forced open with a hammer, cold chisel and a screw driver in Holy Name Hall some time Monday night, authorities said yesterday. Police, however, said last night they had received no report of the break. The safe contained only cancelled cheques which were not removed, it was said. Entrance to the building was gained through a window over the bowling alley in the basement. The hammer, cold chisel and the screw driver were taken from a cupboard in the office. Authorities believed proceeds of a bingo party held in the hall was the motive for the break but only cancelled cheques were kept in the safe.

B. I. S. Hears Semi-Annual Reports Read

Semi-annual reports were submitted at the regular monthly meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society held last Thursday evening. The president, Brother James H. McKenna, presided at the session which was largely attended.

The report of the Charity Committee, described as "the strong arm of the Society," was read by the President and told of a large number of requests for assistance. All were being attended to, the meeting was informed.

Brother P. B. McTague, chairman of the committee in charge of the grave of the Hon. Edward Whelan, told the Society that the plot had been well looked after during the summer.

The Social evening committee report given by President McKenna indicated a large increase in attendance at the weekly dances during the summer. Several letters were read congratulating the Society on the "public speaking machine" which the Society uses to put on a half hour of music each Saturday night.

The revenue of the Society was increasing over former years, Brother J. A. Cronin, treasurer, told in his report.

The secretary, Bro. J. W. Hogan told of a large increase in membership, the majority in good standing, and reported a large number of applications for admission to the organization. They would be read at the next meeting, he announced.

Predicts Big Improvement In Tourist Traffic

An increase in tourist traffic next year "beyond this Province's fondest expectation" was predicted by Mr. A. J. McQuarrie, Moncton, sales manager for the Maritime division of the McColl-Frithenac Oil Company Limited, at a sales convention dinner of the Company's dealers held last night in the Canadian National Hotel.

Mr. McQuarrie cited the present year as the best in the history of the Maritime division and said the paved highway programme in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, coupled with the MacMillan highway in this Province between Borden and Charlottetown, were important contributing factors. Now that the highway from St. John to Tormentine has been completed, he was satisfied that the tourist business here next year would be greatly accelerated.

Presiding at last night's function, which was largely attended, was Mr. J. David Stewart, provincial representative of the Company. Other speakers were Messrs. R. W. Cunningham, a assistant sales manager, Maritime division, and G. B. Longhurst, both of Moncton.

An interesting feature was the presentation of the Company's own motion picture, "Liquid Fire".

PLACING OF UNEMPLOYED VETERANS

The activities during the last six months of the honorary local committee formed in Charlottetown to co-operate with the Veterans Assistance Commission have quite justified its organization. It is a strong committee under the chairmanship of Colonel H. D. Johnson including many former officers and many leading business men of the city, as well as Summerside and Montague, who have joined in the national effort to find employment for veterans who have been long out of work. The country's obligation to these men is two-fold---due to the great service which they rendered during the war, and the handicaps which most of them now suffer in obtaining employment. Neglect of their present difficulty can only result in more rapid deterioration---something which has already seriously disturbed those who have investigated the problem.

It is satisfactory to know that the Charlottetown Committee has not only placed (37) men in permanent or temporary employment and have secured casual employment for (385) but also sees great possibilities of placing a far greater number through the adoption of plans which they now recommend to the Veterans' Assistance Commission and the Government, as a result of their examination of the local situation.

A sympathetic attitude and a good initial response from employers has been met with by the Committee but there are many jobs which could be satisfactorily filled by ex-service men if departmental heads would give the committee the opportunity---for which purpose an office is maintained (Canadian Legion Home, 57 Grafton St., Charlottetown, Phone 727). It is therefore urged that provision be made for an active publicity campaign, local and national, to secure wide and continuous co-operation in placing the veterans.

About half of the unemployed ex-service men are classed as partially fit, and there is much force in the recommendation of the Committee that the Dominion Government itself should give the lead in this national effort---by attempting to fill available sheltered positions in all branches of its service by partially fit and competent veterans' and by providing for the employment of some of these men on all public works that may be undertaken by the Dominion and Provinces together.

It is absolutely essential that the committees have the wholehearted co-operation of the Government. If this condition is not effective, the System will fall beyond all question.

Government co-operation will make it easier to secure the co-operation of the private employers. An experiment is being made in placing veterans with their families on small land holdings near Winnipeg. Ten pensioners have been so placed. And the committee recommends that assistance be given selected veterans who would go on larger farms. There are some veterans with grown boys who are anxious to take up farming. There is much to be said for this proposal.

Other Activities
The man who secures probational training are paid partly by the employers, with the Government supplying this to provide a wage of \$50.00 a month, for a period of not more than three months, after which the employer is to pay the full salary. At the present time only one man is employed under this scheme within the Province---this man being employed with the Sterns Steam Laundry, at Charlottetown. This nature of employment deals with men who are skilled workmen such as plumbers, carpenters, tinmith, and etc. Such positions as commission jobs or farm helpers do not come within the regulations. Any information that is desired by prospective employers may be had by getting in touch with the local headquarters, and several men are available for employment under this scheme. It is respectfully requested of employers that if they have an opening for a veteran under this scheme that they please contact the Secretary of the Honorary Local Committee immediately (Phone 727). It is interesting to note that over 275 veterans throughout Canada have been placed with firms under this scheme since May 1937.

Some 35 have been absorbed into permanent employment as a result of this training. Also, one industrial firm, very much impressed with the entire scheme, has engaged 23 veterans under the plan for six months, instead of three, and is paying the full salary without charge to the Department.

There are, of course, many veterans who are now unemployed, being permanently aged or suffering from disabilities of various kinds. Those on small pensions obtain a supplementary relief allowance from the Government, but those who are not pensioned secure relief from the municipality. The latter system, in the opinion of the honorary Committee, "subjects the veteran to many indignities and hardships which he should not be called upon to suffer." It suggests that the full responsibility for the unemployed veteran should be assumed by the Dominion and that the scope of the War

Veterans' Allowance Act should be widened so as to give the allowance of \$20 a month --- \$40. to a married man --- to incapacitated veterans who served in any theatre of actual war, regardless of their age; and that those who had not served in a theatre of war but are now unemployable should receive the allowance at 65, the retiring age on the railways and other corporations. There would be little difference in cost to the public, but it would be assumed by the Dominion as a national obligation, and it would be showing respect and consideration to whom this is due.

Large Responsibility
The local Committee assigned a large responsibility, voluntarily and from a sense of duty, in trying to work out the problem in this Province of finding work for the unemployed veterans. But they are evidently putting their shoulders to the wheel and are making very hopeful progress. Everything depends on the co-operation which they can secure, and this will doubtless be forthcoming, as the country can hardly forget its permanent obligation to the ex-service men.

In different part of Canada the Veterans Assistance Commission have been incidental in creating projects that have been to the advantage and welfare of the unemployed non-ex-service men, therefore being of assistance to the unemployed in general. In this Province there are at the present time, many projects being carried out by the Dominion and Provincial Governments and which are of a great benefit to hundreds of men and their dependents, but it is the intention of the Dominion, Provincial and Civic authorities to ease the issuance of relief within the Province they should endeavor to have large and worthy projects carried out that would employ all the unemployed within the Province for at least seven months of the year so that they would be in a position financially, to care for their families during the winter months.

Many Countries appear to be able to create and finance large projects which incidentally cut down the actual cost of relief and there is no good reason why the same procedure cannot be carried out within this Province. There are plenty of worthy and needy projects that could be carried out from a financial standpoint of view NOW is the time to do it.
