DEATH OF MRS. WM. MURPHY

The world wide epidemic which we know as Spanish influenza has carried sorrow into many homes in this province.

One of these homes is that of Mr. William Murphy, Montague, whose wife, Jennie McCarron, passed away on Sunday afternoon, the 5th inst., in her 56th year to that better world into which neither sorrow nor pain enter.

The death of Mrs. Murphy was not the first in this home, resulting from the same cause. Only four days before, Mr. Martin Lannigan, son-in-law of deceased, fell a victim to the same dread disease. The late Mr. Lannigan and his wife resided with

his wife's parents. Mrs. Murphy had been waiting with anxious care on her son-in-law, during his sickness, and while so engaged, the disease which carried off both was making inroad on her weakened constitution, terminating so quickly her own earthly existence. Thus it is brought home to us the fact that often there are cases in which weak women sacrifice her own life in behalf of a loved one of the family circle, which we may call unrecorded deeds of true heroism. In the three-fold relations of wife, mother and neighbor, Mrs. Murphy's life was exemplary.

She was a daughter of the late John McCarron, and is survived by her sorrowing husband, and aged mother, one son, James, and her daughter, Mrs. Martin Lannigan, called upon to bear the double loss of husband and mother. Besides these there are three brothers and four sisters. The brothers are: John, chief officer of the Municipal Court, Boston; William, on the homestead, and James, the well known Marine Engineer. The sisters are: Mrs. Owen McCarey, Mrs. Richard Power, and Mrs. Frank Finnigan, all of Roxbury, Mass., and Mrs. McInnis, East Boston.

Her pastor, the Rev. Father Croken, Georgetown, administered the last rites of the Catholic Church. The funeral took place on Monday the 6th inst., and notwithstanding the restrictions enjoined by the health authorities, was largely attended. May she rest in peace.

MRS. ISAAC BEARS

The death occurred at Montague of Mrs. Isaac Bears at the age of 62 Deceased was a daughter of the late Murdoch Bruce, tailor of Commercial Cross. The late Mrs. Bears, who had been ailing for some time took very ill about two weeks ago and on Sunday evening, December 22nd her illness took a decided turn for the worse and small hope of her recovery was entertained. The best medical aid was obtained but on Sunday evening December 29 her gentle spirit passed to Him who gave it.

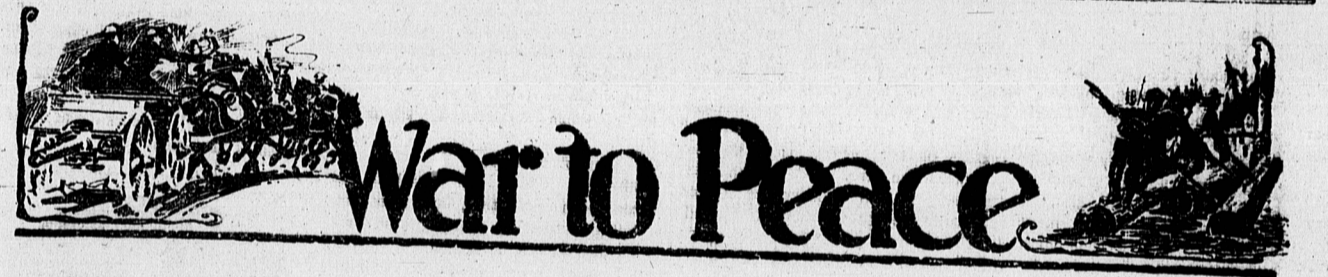
