INTERNATIONAL NICKEL

International Nickel Company's exports of all classes of nickel were sharply reduced in November, bringing total shipments to the lowest point of a single month since August, 1927, except for the first 11 months of the year to date were down nearly 18,000,000 pounds from the corresponding period of 1929, and 7,500,000 pounds below the total for 1928.

ALGOMA STEEL

Confirmation has been given by Algoma Steel Corporation of the announcement in New York of a substantial steel rail order obtained from the New York Central Railway. The amount going to Algoma Steel is 9,310 tons. In addition, Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation receives 2,000 tons, a total for the two Canadian companies of 11,310 tons. The aggregate order placed by New York Central for 1931 is announced as 10,000 tons, the balance being distributed among U. S. Steel companies. The portion distributed in Canada is in recognition of the section of the company's system located in Canada and its operations in this country.
