Political Rally At No. Rustico

The North Rustico district gave every evidence last night of being solidly behind the Progressive Conservative candidates, Mr. W. Chester S. McLure and Wing Omdr. J. Angus MacLean. D.F.C. Candidates were given an enthusiastic reception. After the speakers several from the district made brief talks, pledging support to John Bracken and his candidates.

Mr. Roy Dolron of North Rustico presided. Speakers, in addition to the candidates, included Messrs. John H. Buntain, David Bethune, Philip Matheson, M.L.A., R. B. Bell, M.L.A., A. Henry, J. A. C. Michael, Doyle, G. H. Carr and Mrs. Michael Doyle.

Mr. McLure was the first speaker. He reviewed the guarantees which Mr. Bracken had given this Province to improve transportation, including an additional ferry and the construction of super-highway between Charlottetown and Borden with the building of bridges across North and West Rivers.

Mr. McLure dealt too, with the opening campaign speech of Prime Minister King, referring to his appeal for re-election on the most important sections of the manifesto and enumerated the reforms which the party is pledged to implement. The pledge provided all parties in the House of Commons had voted for the Family Allowance Bill and that all major parties are pledged to retain it.

There was no truth, he declared, in the rumor that it was the policy of the Progressive Conservatives to repeal the Family Allowance Act. The pledge provided increased old age pensions at 65 was referred to by Wing Omdr.

BE YOUR OWN HAIRDRESSER

1. Choose a good shampoo and follow the directions on the label exactly. Measure just enough for two latherings; don't waste it.  
2. Brush your hair well, to loosen dandruff and to remove scales and dust.  
3. Rub in the shampoo with both hands. Hard rubbing isn't necessary, although people like it; but be sure to have suds on every inch of hair and scalp.  
4. Rinse out the first lot of shampoo and rub in another amount with nail brush or toothbrush for difficult spots, such as the hairline or behind the ears, where dandruff is most likely to occur.  
5. Rinse till the water runs clean. You'll never have bright clean hair if you leave traces of shampoo and suds in it. Use warm water and a spray, and don't favor one spot more than another.  
6. Now rub with Turkish towels to remove all the water you can. Then, to take out tangles, brush with a clean hairbrush.

To Set Your Own Hair

1. Set your hair when it is merely damp not wet. It will dry faster and be easier to handle.  
2. Make clean cut parts. Twist each section you are to provide, including with and pin it out of the way.  
3. Part off your rows for pin curls evenly. Use a comb to pick up the little strands neatly. Keep them all the same size and shape. The most common mistake women make in setting their hair is to roll up irregular tufts of hair of varying shapes and sizes, high-ly-piggledy. You can't get a smooth wave, roll, or ringlets this way.  
4. To make a pin curl, place the forefinger where you want the curl, and wrap hair around it in the direction you want the curl to turn. Keep pushing the hair down; don't let it climb over the finger. When all the hair is wound, slip out the finger; and pin the curl flat.  
5. When finished, if your hair is dry, moisten hair with water and pat the pin curls, especially around hairline. Dry thoroughly.

Describes Attempted Assassination of Hitler Last July

BERCHTESGADEN, Germany, May 24 (AP)—The attempt to assassinate Hitler last July 20 would have succeeded if a colonel had not kicked a little bullet briefcase, said Heinz Buchholz, a short-hand carpenter, in the barracks at Rastenburg, East Prussia when the bomb went off.

"I was in the room with Hitler when he was hit by a minor cut from flying glass, continued recording Hitler's confessions until April 30, when he was shot by the Gestapo."

Here is his story of the effort of Col. Von Stauffenberg to kill Hitler:

"Hitler had a conference every day at lunch time. His headquarters was in the forest near Rastenburg. The code name was Wolfeschanze."

"There were about 25 people in the room, which was at the end of the barracks and had windows on three sides. It was the first time Hitler had ever seen Stauffenberg, and Field Marshal Kettel introduced him. Stauffenberg was forming the new Volks Grenadier divisions."

"Col. Stauffenberg set his brief case under the long heavy table and stepped back behind and to the right of Hitler. Hitler was standing in the centre of the long table which was spread with maps. On his right was Gen. Hensinger, then Col. Brandt."

"The conference had just begun when Col. Brandt kicked Col. Stauffenberg's briefcase and seemed annoyed that it was in his way. He stooped and picked it up and set it over about a foot—on the outside of the thick oak slabs that supported the end of the table."

Hitler's Escape

"The conference proceeded and at 12:30, someone called Col. Stauffenberg to the telephone. At 12:45 the brief case exploded with a big burst of yellow flame and black smoke, and the air will be
