The Next Prime Minister



Stirring Passages From Speeches Of Conservative Party Leader At S'ide, Montague And Ch'Town

During his visit to the Province Hon. R. B. Bennett delivered three masterly speeches, addressing enormous crowds at Summerside, Montague and Charlottetown. The following selected extracts are on subjects of prime importance to the electors of this Province and deserve careful reading and analysis:

BACK TO THE MARITIMES.—It is a pleasure to come back amongst one's own friends, and in that large sense in which we of the Maritime Provinces use the word, we thank you for your hospitality and for the generous welcome you have given to me and to my sister. We thank you for coming tonight in such large numbers. I had no idea you would be here in such large numbers. Everywhere we have gone there have been increasing numbers of people to meet us. Where we used to speak to hundreds, there have been gathered thousands. In the great centres of the West, in the cities of the East, men and women have gathered in thousands, showing their great interest in the public questions of the day, showing their concern about the present, their hopes and their aspirations for the future. And that augurs well for the people of this country.

THE BRIGHTER SIDE.—I am sure that at times some of you on this Island—fathers and mothers—when markets are restricted and prices are low and you see little return for the labour of your hands, become a bit depressed, sometimes a bit discouraged. Well, I come to tell you to be not discouraged or depressed, for you have made a great contribution to the life of Canada. Your sons and daughters fill places of great importance, discharging great obligations and responsibilities in the newer parts of Canada—and alas, too many of them in other parts of the world. Lawyers and judges, bishops and pastors, doctors, merchants, bankers, your children are found everywhere, wherever good men and true are required to discharge obligations and accept responsibilities. So at least think of that; and if at times you grow weary with toil, look on the other side of the shield, and see what you have done.

CONTEMPTIBLE PROPAGANDA.—There are two or three "back door" canvasses which we hear about. One is with reference to soldiers' pensions. I have tried to keep this question out of politics. Two years ago I approached the Government to introduce a Pensions Act whereby the applicant soldier would get the benefit of the doubt. They refused to consider it. I moved it as an amendment in Parliament. They voted it down by a solid majority. This year they accepted it and a non-partisan committee put it through and it is now part of the laws of Canada. But I hear that a candidate has been going around this Province in one constituency, among people who sent their sons to the War, telling them that all they had to do was to sign a paper, that he would send it up to Mr. Mackenzie King and Mr. King would give them \$2,000 a year for life. Have we fallen so low as to accept such shameful methods of soliciting votes? If any candidate of the Liberal party or any other party comes around and tells you a story like that,—show him the door! He is no friend of Canada or of

LLOYD GEORGE MAKES APPEAL TO CHURCHES

To Aid In Dissipating International Distrust And Suspicion.

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., July 6.—Churches of the world were besought by Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, former Prime Minister and Liberal Leader to aid in dissipating international distrust and suspicion, in a speech before the International Congregational Church Council. After assertions that every country of the world was preparing for war, and that there were more men trained for war in every country in Europe, Asia and America than before the catastrophe of 1914, he declared: "I speak from personal experience when I say that although I have gone to live in a quiet place in Surrey, I hear every day the rattle of machine guns in one camp, the hoarse roar of cannon in another, and, carried by the westerly breeze, I hear the boom of naval artillery from the direction of Portsmouth, and the drone of aeroplanes. That is going on in every civilized land on earth. It is really time the churches took this thing in hand. I don't know who else can do it. We are building up barriers against each other, putting up fences against each other and restrictions against each other. We are blockading each other, and we are trying to starve each other. Trade is treated as if it were contraband. The atmosphere is poisoned with suspicion and mistrust."

Saturday Was Memorable Day For The Conservative Party In Prince Edward Island—Ovation Tendered Hon. R. B. Bennett At Montague And Charlottetown. In Masterly Speech At Charlottetown Mr. Bennett Denounces Delay In Implementing Duncan Report And Deals Convincingly With Tariff And Other Issues.

Addressing massed crowds at the Montague Rink Saturday afternoon and in the Strand Theatre Saturday evening, Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, concluded his triumphant campaign visit to Prince Edward Island yesterday afternoon when he left on the S. S. Hochelaga for Pictou. Never in recent years has a political leader so impressed the electors of the Province with his message or received so enthusiastic an ovation as did Mr. Bennett on this memorable occasion. Talking to upwards of 2,000 people at Summerside, to 1,500 people at Montague and to an audience which jammed the theatre in Charlottetown to its utmost capacity, his words were also carried by radio into the homes of thousands of other people throughout the Province. They were heard with breathless interest, with sustained attention, with frequent outbursts of applause and vociferous cheering.

ACCORDING TO RETURNS TABLED IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS LAST SESSION, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND RECEIVED THE FOLLOWING SUMS OF MONEY GRANTED UNDER LEGISLATION PASSED BY THE PREVIOUS CONSERVATIVE GOVERNMENT:

Bad Collision Saturday Evening

Gasoline Truck And Buick Sedan Meet Almost Head On At Corner Of Malpeque And Royalty Roads—Several Injured, One Seriously.

One of the most serious automobile accidents of the summer occurred Saturday evening about seven o'clock at the corner of Malpeque and Royalty roads, when a gasoline truck of the Nicholson Oil Company, Summerside, and driven by a man named Nicholson, collided with a Buick six sedan driven and owned by William Munn of this city.

In the car with Munn were his four children, two girls, Elsie and Babe, and two boys, Percy and Wendell, also Jack Hawkins, linotype operator.

As a result of the collision Mr. Hawkins was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital suffering severe head injuries and concussion. He remained unconscious for several hours and at an early hour this morning was reported to be in a serious condition. Mr. Munn's children were also badly bruised and cut, especially Elsie, who was more seriously injured than the other children. All received prompt medical attention and were reported last night as resting comfortably. Mr. Munn, who also received a severe shaking up, stated that he and party left Charlottetown Saturday evening about 6 o'clock when just off the Royalty road crossing, he met the gasoline truck going at what he stated to be a high rate of speed.

An almost head-on collision took place, the Buick car being carried 25 or 30 feet along the road. Two of his children, boys, were thrown out on the road and when picked up were in a semi-conscious condition. Mr. Munn's car was damaged beyond repair. The truck had a badly damaged radiator.
