STAFF CHANGES.

With this issue D. S. McRae severs his connection with The Guardian, he having resigned from the position as News Editor. Mr. McRae has had charge of the news department for nearly four years past, having previously served on The Examiner of this city. His work on the paper speaks for itself, and during the time of his official connection with this journal he has gained a wide circle of acquaintances and made many friends, who will join with his newspaper associates in wishing him every success in future life. Mr. McRae intends locating in Edmonton, Alberta, for which point he leaves in a few weeks time.

Archibald Irwin who has been appointed News Editor needs no introduction to the people of Charlottetown or the Province among whom he is so favorably known from his former connection with The Examiner, his conduct of the Prince Edward Island Magazine and as the capable Secretary of the Tourist Association. In all these positions he has done excellent work. In addition to his staff duties as News Editor Mr. Irwin will be Associate Editor of The Magazine Guardian, for which duty his previous experience in Magazine work has given him a valuable training.

Is the whiskey trade a good trade, conducive to morals, sobriety, law and order, a business to be encouraged? Is the whiskey den a place where you would like your boy to resort and spend his time and money? If not then go to the polls today and vote just opposite to the way the rum-seller votes. Vote "against the Act" and close the bars.

The Journal in its zeal for the whiskey trade has packed its columns full of untruths and misrepresentations with regard to prohibition and its effects in Charlottetown. It counts upon these deliberately false statements going to the electors so late in the campaign that they cannot be contradicted before the polling takes place. Among these false statements is that the police court records show an increasing number of arrests for drunkenness in Charlottetown. The reverse of this is true, and known to be true by every reader of the daily newspapers here.

Summerside electors today will show by their votes whether they desire the open saloon as they have had it, or have the bars closed down. They will say by their votes whether they wish the laws of the land to be honestly enforced or perverted from their honest purpose. Everywhere throughout Canada public sentiment is growing stronger against the open bar. Scores of municipalities in Ontario have given their voice to close the bars and saloons since the new year came in. We believe the best sentiment of Summerside is in favor of a like course. It will be creditable to Summerside today if a majority vote is recorded "Against the Act," with the object of closing the whisky dens.

In the federal plebiscite of 1900 Prince County gave a large majority in favor of Prohibition. The result was as follows: In West Prince 1352 in East Prince the vote stood 2,003 for and 212 against. The total vote in the County for Prohibition was 3,355 and the total vote against it 450, giving a majority of 2,905 for Prohibition. We confidently count on a good majority for Prohibition today. We trust our temperance friends will spare no effort to make it as large as possible. The one danger is that the electors who are in favor of Prohibition may neglect to go to the polls. Let every elector do his duty, go to the polls and induce his neighbor to do so and the result is assured.
