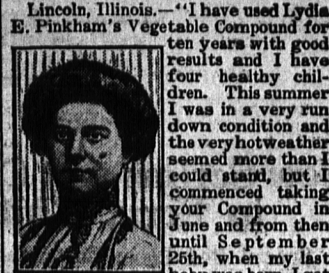

Bonnie Boy 2.07 1/2, campaigned by Guy Lee of Union City, Tenn., has started in 66 races during the last six years, winning 26 firsts, 23 seconds, nine thirds, two fourths and six times unplaced. His winnings total \$9,491.

There will be the usual King's Birthday races on the Charlottetown Driving Park. The programme has not yet been decided on, but it will likely include in a free-for-all, a 2.30 pace and a 2.40 trot.

The usual matinee races under the auspices of the Charlottetown Driving Club will be held the coming season. Last years races under the same auspices were most successful.

There will be the usual races at Charlottetown in connection with the fall fair. The exhibition dates are September 26-29, and there will be racing each day.

heard in that House. He left it to them to say whether in their recollection ever such debasement had been exhibited. He had allowed a number of evasions of the rules and orders to occur because he knew there were many new members who were unfamiliar with them, but a wilful, violent and personal attack such as they had just witnessed was not a thing that could be tolerated in that House, and he was sure he had the support of the whole House in that connection. The hon. member from Cardigan must learn that the Leader of the House was not putting himself above the rules, nor arrogating to himself any special privileges, when he called attention to the point of order and reviewed the incidents which led up to it. That was not only his privilege but his duty.

Mr. BELL: I concur in some of the statements of the hon. the Leader of the Government, and I do hope the members will regard their own dignity and the dignity of that House in future. The PREMIER: As Leader of the Government I may now suggest that the incident is closed, and I may join in the hope expressed by the Leader of the Opposition that there will be no recurrence.

Mr. BELL: Am I to understand that the incident is closed? Can I not speak further on the subject? The PREMIER: No, I explained a point of order, and the matter ends there.

Mr. BELL: But I want to refer to another matter, a matter which directly concerns me and referred to by the Premier.

The PREMIER: If you want to make a personal explanation that is another matter. Mr. BELL said the Premier had made some remarks about his having sneered at the father of the member from Bradalbane. Anything he had said was complimentary and to his credit when he remarked his opinion about the deficit. Mr. Bell said that he was not prepared to support a progressive policy if it meant plunging the Province into another \$97,000 deficit. The matter was afterwards allowed to drop.

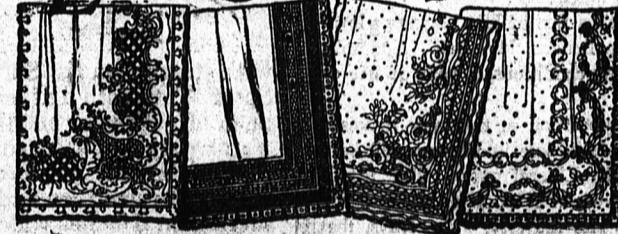
