Murphy were brought to Summerside on Thursday morning where bonds were given for their appearance. The case against them comes up for hearing before Stipendiary Wright, at Summerside, on Tuesday next.

—The community at large was shocked to hear of the sudden death of Robert Acorn, of North St. Eleanor's, who passed peacefully away while sleeping on Friday morning, Jan. 13th. Deceased was seventy-three years of age and leaves to mourn besides a sorrowing widow, six sons: Alonzo, of Blue Lake, Calif.; Herbert, of Eureka, Calif.; Ernest, of Revere, Colo.; Hamilton, of New Bedford, Mass.; Everett, of Belmont, Lot 16, and Elmer, at home, and three daughters: Mrs. William Davidson, of Cripple Creek, Alta.; Mrs. C. Harris, of Summerside, and Miss Nellie, of St. Luke's Hospital, Bedford. A very impressive funeral took place on Sunday, 15th inst., conducted by Rev. Jas. St. George, pastor of the Summerside Methodist Church, of which deceased was a member, and the members of the L. O. L., of which deceased was an honorary member, led the procession to the cemetery at Lot 16 and conducted a short service after the regular service. The pall-bearers, members of the L. O. L., were: Henry Barrett, Robert Barrett, M. Higgins, Levi Silliphant and John Rider.—Com.

One of the trustees interviewed in connection with this matter, said it was a rule established by the officials not to allow the children to enter the school before one of the teachers arrived each morning and the trouble yesterday morning was owing to the teacher whose turn it was to admit the scholars, not arriving at the school until about 9.15 and as a result of her tardiness the children were obliged to stand out around the doors shivering in the cold. Judging from the remarks made by the trustees this accident is not likely to happen again.
