Two cargoes of Prince Edward Island produce arrived yesterday, one by the schooner Oressa Belle, from Montague, which contained 3,700 bushels potatoes, 400 bushels turnips, 100 bushels carrots and 300 bushels oats. The schooner C. M. C., from Murray River, P. E. I., had 1,600 bushels potatoes and 100 bushels turnips. Another mixed cargo was landed from Larry's River, by the schooner Sadie, consisting of 100 bbls. berries, 150 quintals dry fish, 75 barrels herring, 5 barrels mackerel and 8 casks cod oil.
