MINK FARMING.—From letters to hand from all parts of the country, in both Canada and the United States, it looks as if mink farming in the near future would prove a good second to that of silver fox. Owing to the very high price that mink pelts have been bringing in the market during the past year, a larger amount of money can now be made through mink farming than was the case a few years ago. Then again, many of the mink ranchers have gained considerable knowledge, and can now raise these animals in captivity without experiencing much loss. We are continually being asked questions regarding the raising of mink, and we would welcome any articles regarding their care and breeding from experienced ranchers.—Black Fox Magazine.

RECORD FOX PRICE.—The July number of the Black Fox Magazine says: Alfred Fraser, the American representative for C. Lampson & Co., informs us that at the last London sales a record price was made for both blue and cross fox, £100 being paid for a particularly fine blue fox pelt and £52 for a cross. One silver pelt brought \$250 and was a three-quarter black with a bright silver rump. Mr. Fraser says that while black skins sold considerably higher than for some time past, he does not think this type of fox will ever again realize the fabulous prices which were once paid, the demand now being for bright, clear, silvery skins, which range from "pales to darks" or "three quarter black", the value of course depending entirely upon the beauty and quality of the individual skins. Mr. Fraser is inclined to think that present high prices will be maintained at the coming October sales and may even show a further advance.

CHAUTAUCUA DAY AT ROTARY.—At the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club held yesterday at the Rose and Grey the presence of a number of the visiting Chautauquans added much to the pleasure of the occasion. Mayor Wright presided. The programme opened with an original song composed by Rotarian Van Buskirk. Mr. W. R. Green, Chautauqua Superintendent, followed with a few remarks in which he suggested that the Rotarians take up the Chautauqua extension movement during the winter. Delightful contributions to the programme were supplied by members of the Eckhoff-Jordan Company including a soprano solo by Miss Millicent Melrose, which was warmly

encored and a flute solo by Miss Marion Jordan, which was also a great treat. Mr. Thomas Curtin, the noted war correspondent followed with a decidedly interesting address in which he dealt with some phases of the war. Among other things he referred to the successful battle of the Northcliffe Press to increase the much needed supply of munitions, to the German propaganda and the corruption in Russia which made that country an easy prey for Hindenburg. He said that one big lesson of the war was that although Germany had every card stacked with which to win, she had failed. The Allies were held together because they had right cause and Germany lost because she was wrong. Mr. Curtin, in the course of his intensely interesting address related graphic episodes out of the rich fund of his memorable experiences to illustrate conditions in Russia and Austro-Hungary. He said he was optimistic with regard to America's future and also to Canada's future, and spoke of the immigration that was bound to come to Canada after the war. A vote of thanks, moved by Rotarian Walter S. Grant, seconded by Premier Arsenault and supported by Rotarian Black was tendered to Mr. Curtin and the young lady entertainers. Mr. Green, Miss Melrose and Mr. Curtin made fitting acknowledgements.
