"SCOUT COMMISSIONER AT MONTAGUE—Mr. Warren, Provincial Commissioner, the Boy Scouts Association, was in Montague on Thursday in connection with the Boy Scout Extension campaign, and visited each member of the Montague Troop committee, explaining briefly to each one the aim in view and arranged for a short meeting the same evening. The meeting was held in the Memorial School and was attended by a large number of the town's leading citizens. Mr. Warren gave a very interesting and instructive talk on the aims and methods of the Boy Scouts Association in developing good character in boys and preparing them for good citizenship by training them in habits of observation, obedience and self-reliance; in instilling loyalty and helpfulness to others; teaching them services useful to the public and handicrafts useful to themselves, and promoting their moral and physical development in true comradeship by healthful open-air pursuits and games. He carefully explained that the Boy Scout movement is not military, although many uninformed people believe it to be such. The motto of the Boy Scouts is "Be prepared," which means that they are always to be ready in mind and body, to do their duty and meet any emergency. That the boys absorb the idea of this motto, and live up to it, is witnessed by the number of medal awards made each year for exceptional instances of good work in emergencies. Many hundreds of lesser cases go unmentioned. The method of Boy Scout training is largely one of natural appeals—games and recreative exercises which lead the boys on to learn for themselves many useful crafts. It is a scheme along the lines of elder and younger brotherly playing games together, rather than of instructions to privates by officers of a out-and-dried disciplinary machine, or of pupils at a school. The promise taken by every Scout on joining the Association is "On my honour I promise that I will do my best to do my duty to God and the King, to help other people at all times and to obey the Scout Law." The Scout Law is of a tenfold nature. The active membership today is over 2,200,000 and can be found in every civilized country in the world. In Canada the membership is 65,000, but many thousands of boys are growing up today in discouraged "unemployed" homes, living month after month in relief. Never has there been greater need for such a sound influence as that of Scouting. With this in mind a call has been issued as a service to Canada by His Excellency the Governor General, the Earl of Beaulieu, Chief Scout for Canada, to increase the number of boys benefitting by Scouting from 65,000 to 100,000. This calls for greatly increased financial help. There are no emurmurs whatsoever in connection with the Association. From the Scoutmaster to the Chief Scout for the world, Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell, the services rendered the movement are absolutely free, the money raised in the campaign will be used for organizing new troops for better camp equipment and to make it possible for more boys to take advantage of the training in self reliance and efficiency rendered at camp. **IN MEMORIAM**

**JOHN CECIL BURNS**

One of the largest and most impressive funerals ever held in Charlottetown was held there on January 14, from the United Church, of that place, to the People's Cemetery, when all that was mortal of John Cecil Burns, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Burns, was laid there to sleep.

Until a week before his death, he had been apparently in good health and had felt very deeply the death of a chum. In some unknown way he contracted scarlet fever but neither his Doctor nor nurse seemed to think his condition serious until a few hours before his death, when it was found his heart was giving out. Conscious that he was dying he thought not of himself but of his mother, whom he knew worshipped him, and who was frantic with grief at the loss of her only boy.

Whispering words of comfort to her, he met death in the same way he met everything that came up in life, with a brave and happy smile. Of a kind and loving disposition, he was truly loved in the community in which he lived, by both young and old. That he had many friends was proven by the large number of letters of sympathy which poured into his home, which at that time was under quarantine, making it doubly hard for his stricken family, who could not attend his funeral. Rev. Mr. Crowe of Bebedue and J. W. A. Nicholson officiated at house, church and grave.

Although only 18 years of age, he was widely known owing to his remarkable ability as an athlete. He loved all sports, jumping, running, swimming, playing ball. He was an enthusiastic hockey player, and a member of the team in his district, where he will be sadly missed by the boys and girls. His loss seemed almost impossible to bear. His father had learned to look very much to him, his helper and adviser and he was truly a son any parent would be proud to own. Always singing about his work at home, the loved happy voice is stilled. The only son of a prosperous farmer his prospects indeed looked bright and his parents had many plans for him, but God had plans laid on a bigger and brighter scale.

He was a member of the Scouts of Bebedue and Charlottetown, and his brother Scouts were his pallbearers, namely, Ira Lewis, Alan Clow, Horace McFarlane, Morris Deacon, Robert Jardine and Wilfred Burns. Besides his parents there are left to mourn the loss of their dearly beloved brother, two sisters, Florence and Madeline Burns, also his aged grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Colin Reeves of Lower FreeTown
