"In Old Colorado" Uses 1000 Cows In Great Scenes

More than 1,000 head of cattle were driven into the Lone Pine area of the Mojave Desert for range scenes in Paramount's "In Old Colorado" which opens today at the Capitol Theatre. This is the thirty-seventh of the "Hopalong" Cassidy picture which has starred William Boyd.

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Czech Supplies From Canada Are Safe

A cable to the Canadian Red Cross Headquarters received from the overseas Office revealed that high quantities of Canadian supplies given to the Czech Red Cross for relief work were rescued when the Czech Warerhouse was demolished in the disaster which ended bombing of London. The cable read: "Czech Red Cross in London destroyed, but all Canadian Red Cross material sent there salvaged. They worked on Saturday night saving clothing and supplies and small losses almost nil." The despatch from overseas revealed that Czech Red Cross goods had just been sent to northern Ireland for the relief of bombed victims in Nazi raids on Belfast and other centres. The relief supplies are being distributed to the Irish by the Women's Voluntary Services. Canadian survivors who landed in England from a "recently lost British bound ship" were provided with new personal property outfits including pyjamas, sweaters, socks, razors and other comforts, the cable said.

Supplies to Czech and other refugee groups in England given by the Canadian Red Cross since the first of the year totalled 376 075 articles of comforts and hospital supplies and 228 566 articles of relief clothing.

R. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former prime Minister of Canada, recently presented on behalf of the Canadian Red Cross, a new recreation hut to Canadian soldiers serving "somewhere in England" according to information received at the Canadian Red Cross. The event was attended by several hundred civilians and soldiers and Lady Patricia Ramsay declared the building "Canadian soldiers' home dear to my heart," she said.

During the last war Canadian troops and a recreation hut on expedition in the same spot. It was reopened soon after this war commenced but was badly in need of repairs. The Canadian Red Cross overseas repaired it generously toward the end of the war and it is now a model entirely new.

Under General Victor Odium, Commanding Officer, 2nd Canadian Division, the Czech Red Cross on behalf of the troops, Alfred Steve Brodie, a private in a Toronto regiment, spoke for the troops. Colonel R. J. MacNeil, who is now in command of the Canadian auxiliary in England attended the ceremony.

In presenting the hut Mr. Bennett said: "I trust you will look upon it as a symbol of a great people fighting the world over for liberty."

PRISONER OF WAR

The first letter from a British prisoner of war in Germany giving full details of his life in a German prison camp was read to the British Council of the Canadian Red Cross.

Charles Arthur Hook, taken prisoner at Dunkirk, wrote his letter from his cell in a prison camp, 246 Grand Boulevard, Montreal. "We have parcels (my things since I've been prisoner) Some things were extremely fortunate and got the Canadian type. What a lovely parcel—honey and a box of butter (but getting me a parcel like that with one addition—a couple of tin of peanut butter. I dream of the stuff."

Red Cross officials believe the Canadian food parcels, first to be distributed in Germany, were in a shipment 5,000 sent to Marseilles from the American Red Cross. The parcels were received by the Canadian Red Cross representatives who have arrived in splendid condition.

The Canadian Red Cross is packing 10,000 food parcels a week for British prisoners of war in Germany at the request of the British Red Cross.

Miss Dalton had entered the Hospital one year and a half, before as a student nurse. 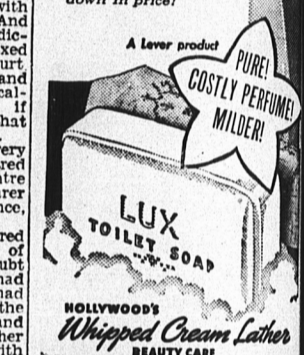

Forestry training Cancelled this year

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 12 (CP)—The engineering and forestry camps held each year by the undergraduates of the University of New Brunswick at this time are this year cancelled and postponed until September 8th.

The postponement of the camps is caused by the Canadian Officers' Training Corps contingent of the University of New Brunswick, which is now in military training summer camp on the island at Woodstock next Saturday, 29th of all ranks attending.

Last year the military camp which was held at Camp Sussex was later in the year and which gave the engineering and forestry students ample time to attend the forestry course which is part of the university course.

The C.O.T.C. of the university will be the first military unit to go into summer military camp in Military District No. 7, they will be followed by the C.O.T.C. of Mount Allison University, St. John's, N.S. The C.O.T.C. of St. Joseph's University contingent will also go into camp at Woodstock, followed by infantry units this next month.

BRITISH CHEMISTS USE NEW PROCESSES FOR FRUIT

LONDON, May 14—Empire countries with crops of fruit held up by lack of shipping will be interested in the new storage processes of British chemists at Bristol University Research Station, originally designed to meet the problem of Britain's own surplus fruit, but which now are now available for Empire producers.

Surplus apples are economically stored, with great saving of space, in the form of applying sugar, apple treacle, natural sugar, and other fruit juices, extremely sweet, and it is a valuable substitute for cooking in all forms of household uses. Soft fruits, plums and apricots, are reduced to a dry fine powder, useful for processing. Plum powder can be made into jam at any time of the year.

In their work on blackcurrant syrups, the experts have found that after a long period of storage, there was present, in some cases, a preventive agent, the shortage of fresh citrus juices, and also drawn attention to the need for using all surplus carrots, and a powder is in plant extracted commencing in plant normally used for the spray drying of milk.
