His Excellency briefly outlined the history of the Credit Union movement from its inception in Germany in the last century and its subsequent importation to this country and its tremendous growth here. He stressed the need of education and study by the members and particularly by the Board of Directors. He quoted one of the pioneers of the movement (that "members without union are powerless and union without knowledge is useless.") The cooperative movement should be a school of adult education, he said. Concluding he gave the philosophy of the movement as "joint action, joint benefits, joint responsibility."

Interesting Service At St. Paul's Church

His Excellency Bishop Boyle of Charlottetown officiated yesterday afternoon in St. Paul's Church, Summerside, for the purpose of canonically erecting the Stations of the Cross. These Stations had been purchased just before the church was destroyed by fire in February, 1946, and had not been canonically erected. They were saved from the fire and placed in the new building. Bishop Boyle addressed the congregation on the meaning of the Stations of the Cross. In his opening remarks he congratulated the people of the parish on the manner in which they had carried on when their church was destroyed and on the new building that they had erected. The service concluded with pontifical benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.
