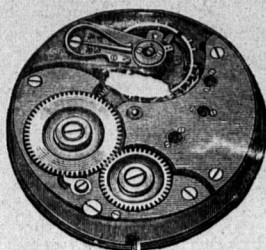

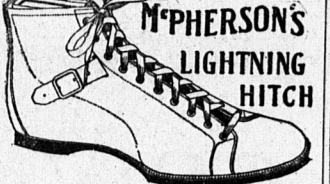

The reason of this is they are said to destroy the mails. These cards can be sent locally anywhere in Canada. As this latter order has not been known to the public there have been quite a number sent and held up by the authorities.

EXCELSIOR Farmers' Institute met in the Hall at York Saturday evening Jan. 6th, Pres. Brodie in the chair. Regarding the Government stock farm, George Vessey was of the opinion it should be retained and stock imported from England as in the good old days. J. H. Gill and P. Brodie thought that too many hands were employed and that the farm should carry the best grades of sheep and hogs as well as other stock. On motion of Henry Howard it was resolved that it be recommended that the best grade of beef and milk cattle, hogs and sheep be imported direct from the Old Country, that the three countries have an equal share of the said stock at the annual sale, that no experimental work be carried on except at the expense of the Dominion Government, that the present buildings be retained but improved. Pres. P. Brodie then introduced the tariff question showing that the different interests of the Dominion were urging changes for their particular benefit. He urged the farmers who constituted by far the greater number in the Dominion to unite and make their influence felt. Geo. Vessey was of the opinion that 20 or 25% was sufficient protection for any industry and that a greater preference be given British goods than at present obtains, and the tariff wall be raised against such high protectionist countries as the United States. Henry Howard and Peter Brodie were then appointed delegates.
