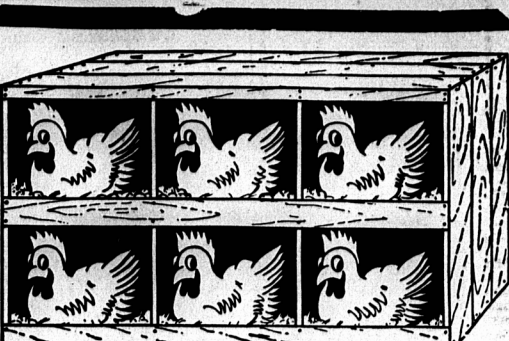

Big Boom Hits London Theatres

By ALLAN NICKLESON LONDON, Jan. 19 - (CP) - There has never been anything like the boom now sweeping London theatres.

While new plays await the vacating of theatres by old, more than 50,000 persons pay \$12,500 daily at 58 West End Theatres. Another 45,000 pay \$21,500 at 20 suburban Playhouses.

Advance bookings are 26 per cent higher than a year ago and gross takings at West End theatres are 15 per cent higher than last year's record. There are packed houses everywhere, and provincial theatres are sharing in the boom.

Pantomime, with all its incongruities and absurdities, has satisfied the seasonal appetite of the playgoers so well that these hardy perennials which open around Christmas and end around March have been a major factor in the entertainment rush.

A leading showman estimated that seven productions staged in the West End especially for the Christmas and end around March ends.

Public demand for pantomime is so great that most theatres have shows each morning, besides six evenings and four matinee performances weekly. The morning shows arranged mostly for children, attract many servicemen and women.
