COOK'S CORNER

COCOA PASTRY. 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour. Or 3 cups sifted pastry flour. 2 tablespoons cocoa. 2 tablespoons sugar. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon (optional). 2-3 cup milk (approximately). 1/4 cup cold water (approximately). Sift flour, cocoa, sugar, salt and cinnamon if used together. Using two knives or a pastry blender, etc. fine crumbs. Gradually add water until dough clings together. Roll out and line 9-inch pie plate. Prick and bake at a 425 degree F. for 10 to 15 minutes. Use with a plain cream filling. Yield: 2 shells.

Add to dressing, mixing well. Turn into wet mould. Chill until firm. Unmould on crisp lettuce. Six to eight servings. If desired, additional dressing may be served with the salad.

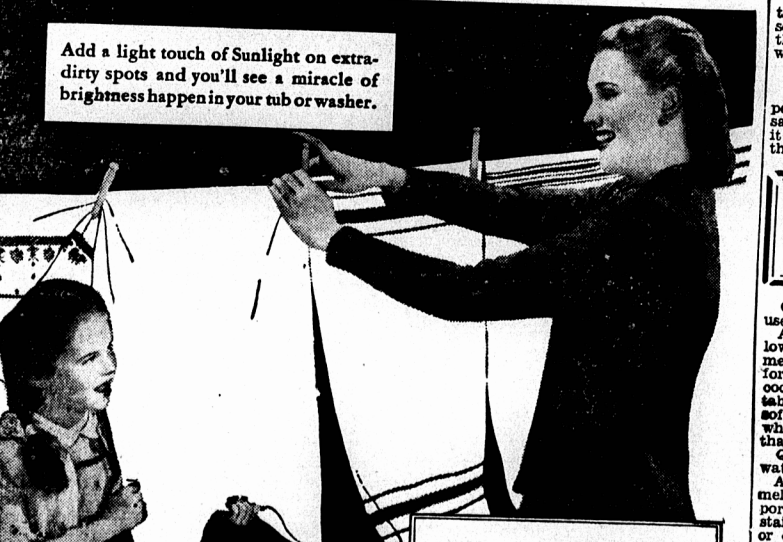
