Every town occupied by the British is fast becoming a center of British influence.

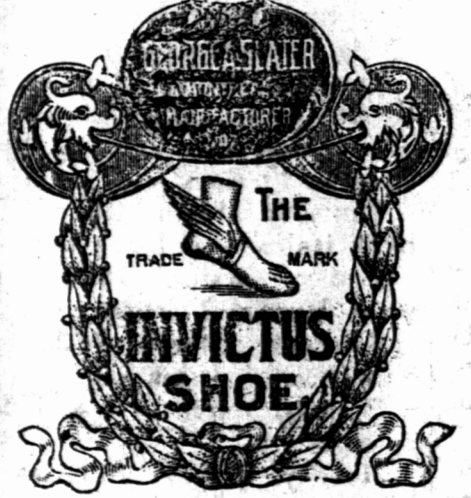
**PRINCELY LORD STRATHCONA.**

The two latter waylaid the Lantz brothers on the way home from Anglican church service. Ermack fell wounded with three bullets, one being in the bowels, from which he has since died.

## COUNCIL MEETING

### Considers Various Current City Affairs

## DUKE CORNWALL VISIT

### Oil Storage in City. Water Act Amendments, Steam Roller, &c.

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held last evening there were present, His Worship the Mayor, and Councillors Wheat, Taylor, Tanton, Mac, Donald and Lyons. The Clerk read the result of the last election, and minutes of last meeting which were adopted. Sundry small bills were ordered to be paid. A communication was read from the Secretary of the School Board stating that the estimated expenditure for the ensuing year was as follows:—Current Expenses \$9,683; interest, \$1,000. Total \$10,683. This amount was to be levied and assessed upon the city.

On comparison it was found this was over \$200 in excess of that granted last year, and that \$300 of the permanent increase was due to the advances in teachers' supplements. After a brief discussion in which several expressed their opinion that in the future the School Board be asked to confer with the Council before making any further increase, the matter was ordered to stand over.

The Clerk read a letter from Recorder Haszard who gave his opinion re the storage of Kerosene oil, &c. within the city limits which was referred to him at the last meeting of Council. Mr. Haszard stated that he found there are now no municipal regulations in force controlling the storing of petroleum, &c. The bye-law relating to the same was repealed many years ago. The control therefore is now under the Dominion statute, which forbids the storage of oil within the city limits under penalty of \$25 for first offence and \$50 for second.

If the City is desirous of having the regulation enforced a memorial from the Council should be forwarded, setting forth the facts as they at present exist and the menace to the City if the present state of things is allowed to continue, and ask that the orders in council in this behalf be strictly enforced.

Coun. Lyons believed the Council should ask the Government to have the law enforced.

Coun. Wheat thought such action would be a serious matter for the merchants as the removal of oil outside the city would tend to increase the price.

Coun. Taylor did not consider it proper to have such a quantity of oil stored in the City, but did not believe the City had a right to construct a building without remuneration for the same.

It was moved by Coun. Wheat, seconded by Coun. McDonald that the City Clerk forward a copy of the Recorder's opinion to the Board of Trade, requesting them to give their views re storage of oil before the City Council take any action on the matter. Motion carried.

Coun. Wheat then moved the following resolution seconded by Coun. McDonald that the draft from the Waterworks Engine Co. for \$4,980 for the crusher be paid.

Coun. Wheat moved a resolution which was adopted, expressing loyalty and asking that the Duke of Cornwall be invited to visit the Island. Copies to be sent to the Governor, Premier, and to Sir Louis Davies.

Coun. Wheat moved, seconded by Coun. Macdonald that the Recorder prepare an amendment to the Water Works and Sewerage Act to enable the Council to utilize the surplus from the water works towards paying the expenses of the management of the sewerage and that the bill be submitted to the Council for approval. —Carried.

A sample of street signs, manufactured by Mr. P. H. Trainor was then submitted. Mr. Trainor agreed to furnish these, and put them up at 65 cents each. He would guarantee their durability. After discussion the matter was referred to a committee consisting of Coun's Taylor, Lyons and Wheat.

Coun. Wheat gave notice that at next meeting he would introduce a bye law re granting of licences. Council adjourned.

**RUSSIA THREATENS HARDER TERMS.**

 WASHINGTON, March 11. (Special).—The British answer to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty amendment is a dignified but complete rejection of the Senate amendment and leaves on the American Government the responsibility for any further action that may be deemed necessary.

## BOILER WAS CONDEMNED

**AWFUL BOILER EXPLOSION KILLS 40.**  
 CHICAGO, March 11. (Special).—Doremus' Laundry was wrecked by a boiler explosion. About thirty girls and seventy-five men worked in the building and so far a dozen dead and the injured have been taken out.

It is believed that twenty-five are dead still in the ruins, which took fire immediately.

**BOILER CONDEMNED—OWNER ARRESTED.**  
 A. F. Doremus, the owner of the building, has been arrested, as he was warned on Friday by the city inspector not to use the boiler.

**SUGAR REDUCED IN PRICE.**  
 MONTREAL, March 11. (Special).—Local refiners have brought the price of sugar down twenty cents per hundred today in sympathy with the recent fall in New York. This makes granulated sugar \$4.45.
